#### DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This office building was one of three owned in the same area by Colonel R. H. Busby. This was his office building.

The exterior is dark brick reached by six steps. Two pilasters flank the front face of the building. Four windows and the door are contained in the lower portio of the building. Above them was a clerestory that has now been covered on the exterior by a metal strip. A string course of white stone divides the building facade in two horizontally. In the upper portion there are three "rennaissance" windows, topped by stone lintels and by a decorative cornice of white stone having a molded pattern of leaves. Set at the top of the facade is the date 1907 divided by a large, decorative cartouche of leaves and hornes of plenty inscribed with a large B. The top of the building is crowned by another row of white stone.

The interior has all mahogany woodwork and doors. Mahogany panelling extends about four feet up the wall from the floor. Every door has a stained glass window in it. There are several rooms downstairs consisting of offices, meeting rooms and storage rooms. There is also a large safe built into the wall.

The original staircase leads to the second floor which also contained offices. This floor is now occupied by a lawyer. The second floor ceilings have been lowered.

Very little of the interior of this building has been changed.

#### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This building was built by Colonel R. H. Busby, a general sales agent in the coal department of the Choctaw, Oklahoma, and Gulf Railroad. He built a triplex in what was then south McAlester, Indian Territory that became the hub of the area. He built a theatre, a hotel and this office building. All could be reached from the others. This building and the hotel were connected by an underground tunnel for carriages. This building exemplified the growth and wealth of the then expanding town of McAlester and the boom of the coal industry in the area. It is one of the few retaining considerable integrity, since most have been lost to subsequent development.


