

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This large brick structure with white trim has stood at its location since the 1,2. turn-of-the-century. Very little of the exterior has changed other than the usual patching of the roof and replacement of mortar. The exterior front is organized into three units - two pavilions and a recessed entry way. A string course runs around the attic level, and heavy lintels emphasize the paired windows.

The interior is still striking even though some alterations have been made. There were two lobbies, one at ground level and one at the first balcony level. The upper lobby has been closed off but the lower lobby is much as it was. The original brass light fixture hangs in the center of the room. Several sets of doors led from the lobby into the theater. A delicate fresco is still seen on the ceiling of the lobby and the sloping floor remains. The side rooms off the lower lobby are now used for different functions and no longer have the same character they originally did.

The interior of the theater proper is classical in style, dominated by Ionic themes. Some alterations have been made - the orchestra pit has been covered, the proscenium stage has been made shorter and more narrow, and the ceiling has been lowered to hide the original second, or "Jim Crow," balcony. However, the original features remain beneath the modern alterations. The seats on the orchestra floor have been replaced by pews; the original seats remain in the first balcony. 3.

Outstanding original features of the interior include two boxes with their 4,5. supports, and an ornate molded frieze of foliage motifs accented by small faces. 6. This frieze runs around the perimeter of the lower floor. The boxes are formed of triumphal arches with Ionic columns at each end; a pediment and entablature with a curved parapet enclose the top of each box. The boxes are supported by Ionic columns on each end; the middles are supported by caryatid figures. 7.

### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Busby Theater was the largest theater between Kansas City and Dallas. All large shows and the great names of the theater stopped here on their tours. De Wolf Hopper, a famous dramatic actor, once said "it is one of the most beautiful I have ever seen; it is hardly equaled...". It stands today almost exactly as it did then.

Colonel R. H. Busby was a general sales agent for the coal department of the Choctaw, Oklahoma, and Gulf Railroad. He was the builder of the Busby Theater, the Busby Hotel and the Busby Office building. All three of these buildings were easily reached from the others, either by underground tunnels or by walkways. The original cost of the theater was \$10,000 and it seated 1,650 people.

It was used as a theater until 1933 when the Church of Christ purchased the structure for \$2,300. The Church carried out the alterations but tried to save as much of the original appearance as possible. The essential character of the theater remains, and its ornate interior reflects the munificence of the coal boom days.




