

7. Description

The Shades is set amid live oaks in the undulating farmland near the town of Jackson. The house was built between 1810 and 1820 as a two-story, pitched roof structure, one room deep, with a rear lean-to giving a two room depth on the ground floor. The central hall was probably installed later. A steep staircase ascended directly from the five-bay front porch. This feature has since been moved back. In the 1830's a rear one and one-half story kitchen and dining room wing was built behind the house with a connecting breezeway. The house is constructed of brick laid up in common bond. The facade has an irregular fenestration pattern with two front doors and three windows on the ground story and four evenly spaced windows on the upper story. The porch has heavily proportioned brick and stucco Doric columns which are evenly spaced, but there is no entablature. The house has exterior chimneys and elaborately molded Adam mantels. It is noteworthy for its many surviving 12 over 12 windows.

The front doors were replaced in the late 19th century. Other more recent changes include the replacement of the roofs, the enclosure of the rear breezeway, and the installation of a modern kitchen and bathrooms.


The Shades is significant in the area of architecture as one of four examples of Carolina I houses in the Feliciana Parishes. It stands as an early and important representation of the predominant English heritage of the Felicianas. It is also noteworthy for its fine Adam mantels, its 12 over 12 windows which are an unusual survival, and its simple Doric columns which are typical of the more pretentious buildings in the area.

The Shades was built in 1808 by Alexander Scott, who had migrated to Louisiana from South Carolina in 1803. He lived at The Shades until his death in the early 1840's. The home's next owner was Major E. A. Scott, a son of the builder. E. A. Scott in 1860 is listed as owning 51 slaves, 800 acres of improved land, and producing 165 bales of cotton. Major Scott lived at The Shades until his death in 1903. Subsequent owners were Alexander Scott II and Eva Alexander Scott. Mr. and Mrs. George V. Berger are the present owners.
