

PHOTO 1 -- View of main facade, looking towards the northwest.

Indianapolis architectural firm Rubush & Hunter
designed the building in 1926-27. Note elaborate
terra cotta ornament in "frontispiece," typical of
Churrigueresque style of Spanish Baroque architexture. Sculpted ornament was the work of Alexander
Sangernebo, chief designed for the F.E.Gates Tile
and Marble Company. Marquee, with exception of
signs standing at either end, is largely unaltered.









