The North Monroe Branch is located on a small lot on the corner of Monroe Street, a busy thoroughfare, and Montgomery, a side street. It is a rectangular building fronting on Montgomery, across which is located a supermarket. The building is one story over a daylight basement, and is constructed of red brick. It has a hip roof of beautiful red, green and purple slate shingles. Below the eaves is a frieze which includes very small cone-like ornaments. The detail is restrained, but very fine. The main entrance is located in the center of the longer side and features a brick stairway and a small porch supported by Doric order columns. A metal awning which now covers the stairs is an intrusive, but superficial, addition. The outstanding features of this building are the roof and the main floor windows. Sets of three large windows flank the entrance, with an identical one on the end. They are casement type windows topped by an arched transom.

a. History

This history of the Spokane Public Library's system of branches began in 1905 when one was opened in the basement of a school on the west side of Hangman (Latah) Creek. Other branches, usually established in response to neighborhood demand, followed soon thereafter. In 1912 Andrew Carnegie promised \$70,000 for construction of two permanent branches. The Library Board and the City Council disagreed on where the new buildings should be located, and the compromise that emerged was that the money would be used for three branches. Construction on all three soon began, and all opened in 1914. Of the \$70,000, \$17,500 was allocated for the construction of the North Monroe Branch. It served the community until 1967, when the city sold it to the local chapter of the Veterans of Foreign Wars. They use it as a meeting hall, lounge and bingo parlor.

b. Evaluation of Significance

The North Monroe branch is a good example of a Carnegie library. The pattern which it represents was the most common one selected for Carnegie libraries in Washington state. The architect, Albert Held, was one of the busiest in Spokane.
