The Thomas and Mary Williams Homestead is located less than one half mile east of Taylor, a small Loup County town in the Nebraska Sandhills. The complex includes an 1877 log house, a 1915 frame house, and five additional contributing buildings which date from c.1900-1949: garage, hog house, privy, horse barn, cattle barn and three contributing structures: a windmill, water tank/windmill and the fence system. Two severely deteriorated outbuildings are considered to be non-contributing.

The Thomas and Mary Williams Homestead is located less than one mile east of Taylor, the Loup County seat in the Nebraska Sandhills (1990 population: 186). Loup County is located at the eastern edge of the Nebraska Sandhills, a vast area in the north central part of the state. Several Sandhill counties represent some of the least populated in the nation; the 1990 census reported a total of 683 residents in Loup County. The farmstead represents an 1876 homestead claim which retains its original acreage and log house. The farmstead is located ¼ mile east of a gravel road that leads to Taylor.

The log house, barns, and other farm buildings are clearly visible from the public road. The complex of farm buildings is surrounded by agricultural fields that extend in all directions. The North Loup River, marked by trees along its banks, forms a visual boundary that extends in a southeasterly direction through the property. Beyond the river, the sandhills rise to the horizon.

The contributing resources are described below; numbers correspond with the key to the accompanying site plan. Photo numbers and view are indicated by arrows on the site plan.

#### 1) Log House (photos: 1,2,3,7)

The one story log house was built by Thomas Williams in 1877. Constructed of red cedar logs obtained from an area canyon, the rectangular shaped house is oriented north-south with entrances on each of the gable ends. The building measures 16 by 30 feet and is one room deep. Originally the v-notched house featured a relatively flat board and sod roof. In c.1910 a wood shingled gable roof was added; the wood shingles have since been covered with asphalt. During the historic period a room at the south end was removed. The house exhibits good integrity. Changes such as removal of the south roof, the addition of the gable roof all occurred within the historic period. The house served as the main residence for the Williams family until 1915.

#### 2) Frame House (photo: 2)

The two story frame house built in 1915-1916 is located approximately 30 feet southwest of the log house. The house features a combination hipped/gable roof with dormers on the west, north and south facades. A small shed roof addition is located on the east side of the house and the porch on the main (west facade) has been enclosed; these changes are historic.

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#### 3) Windmill

A 50 foot, c.1910 angle iron windmill is located approximately 15 feet southeast of the frame house.

#### 4) Outhouse

The small frame gable roof c.1920 outhouse which measures  $5 \frac{1}{2}$  by  $6 \frac{1}{2}$  feet is located 40 feet south of the log house.

#### 5) Horse Barn (photo:4)

The large frame c.1900 horse barn is located at the south edge of the complex of buildings. The building features a pitched gable roof with asphalt shingles. The east facade has a hay rack on the gable end and a mow door.

#### 6) Cattle barn/machine shed (photo:5)

The tin sided banked cattle barn/machine shed is located east of the horse barn. The building, consturcted in 1949, is frame with metal siding. The lower level opens to the east with entrances for livestock on the east and south facades. The main level was used for machinery storage.

#### 7) Water tank/windmill (photo:5)

A second angle iron windmill with a small tin sided water tank is located north of the barns.

#### 8) Hog house (photo:6)

A frame c.1920 monitor roof hog house is located at the north edge of the property.

#### 9) Garage (photo: 3)

The frame one stall c.1915 garage is located north east of the log house.

#### 10) Fence system (photos:3,4,6)

The fence system includes woven wire surrounding the frame house as well as various wooden fences separating the houses from the farm buildings.

Two collapsed and severely deteriorated frame buildings are located north of the horse barn. The buildings are scheduled for removal and are considered non-contributing.

The Thomas and Mary Williams farmstead is owned by two of their descendants who use the property as a secondary residence. Although the farmland to the north and east was levelled for irrigation during the 1930's, the property retains its integrity of setting. The current owners lease the land which is still agricultural.

The Thomas and Mary Williams Homestead, located in rural Loup County, Nebraska is being nominated to the National Register under Criterion A at the local level for its association with settlement. The property is significant as a rare example of an 1870's Nebraska Sandhills homestead which retains its original 1877 log house. The period of significance, 1876-1948, encompasses the date of the homestead filing through the final year in which the 50 year age criteria is met.

In the 1870's, Loup County was part of the vast north central Nebraska Sandhills referred to as Sioux County. Located at the eastern edge of the sandhills, Loup County was surveyed by the federal government in 1870-71. Following the 1876 treaty with the Sioux, the area was opened for settlement under the provisions of the 1862 Homestead Act. Like many of the settlers who filed homestead claims in the area, Thomas Williams was a Civil War veteran.

Williams and his wife were both Welsh natives who immigrated to America as minors, and were raised in Pennsylvania. Thomas had enlisted in the Union army in 1861; a year later he and Mary (Lewis) were wed. In 1865, they moved to Missouri; nine years later they continued west to York County Nebraska. In 1876 they moved to the Nebraska sandhills where Williams filed a homestead claim for 160 acres east of present day Taylor in Section 26 bordering the North Loup River.

Similar to other early settlers, the Williams family lived in a dugout while they constructed a more permanent dwelling; a log cabin which was completed in 1877. Available historic accounts and photographs of the area indicate a prevalence of sod construction in the area during the 1876-c1890 initial settlement period. Frame construction was relatively common while log buildings, although more rare were also constructed during this period. The available historic documentation therefore, indicates that while sod construction was predominant, settlers had a choice of building materials.

In January 1884, Thomas Williams received final proof for his homestead claim in Loup County. The application included testimony of Williams and two of his neighbors who served as "witnesses." The two men reported that Williams had fulfilled the claim requirements: continual residency, cultivation of land, and construction of buildings. The log house was described as "16 by 50 feet, of cedar logs with 4 doors and 8 windows. . .habitable during all seasons of the year". The witnesses also stated that Williams had at least 80 acres under cultivation, and had built a "dugout and log stable" and a corral. (U.S. Land Office, Certificate #4591, June 13, 1888.)

A year before Williams received his homestead proof, Loup County was officially organized with its present day boundaries. In 1890 the first census for the county reported a total population 1,662. During the economic depression and drought years that followed the county's population

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would decline to 1,305 by the turn of the century. Following the passage of the Kinkaid Act in 1902, the population would increase. Limited to Nebraska sandhill counties, the Kinkaid Act made 620 acres available for homestead claims. The second settlement period resulted in Loup County's peak population of 2,188 in 1910. Since that time the population has continued to decline to 683 as reported in the 1990 census.

In 1909, one of the first official histories of western Nebraska which included Loup County was published. At the time, the log house still served as the main residence of the Williams family. Throughout the years Williams had expanded his farmstead to over 260 acres and added buildings such as a garage, chicken coop, and horse barn. The history reported that Thomas Williams had experienced "all the hardships that came to the average pioneer, [and] lived in a dugout for the first year." The log house, it continued, "now stands in good shape and [is] more highly prized than any fine building on his farm." (Compendium, 1909, p 776)

In 1915, Williams built a one and a half story frame house approximately 34 feet southwest of the log cabin. According to Williams' descendants, the house was occupied but not entirely finished when he died in August, 1915. His obituary mentioned the log house which was "in a fine state of preservation. . .cherished as a priceless legacy by the entire family." (*The Taylor Clarion* 9-9-1915) After completion of the frame dwelling, the log house continued to serve as an outbuilding on the farmstead. According to available historic photographs and family accounts the original low-pitched roof was replaced with a more steeply pitched gable roof. A room at the east end was removed, reducing the building's length from 50 to 30 feet.

Given this farm's location along the Loup River, there is potential for archeological features within the boundaries of this site. Family lore suggests a Native American presence along the river banks within the historic period. This supposition should be considered before any significant ground disturbing activity on the site be undertaken.

To date, the on-going Nebraska Historic Buildings Survey (NeHBS) has not identified any other settlement era houses in the eastern Nebraska Sandhills. Although nine sod houses were documented in adjacent Blaine County, they date from the Kinkaid era. The Williams homestead therefore, is a rare example of an 1870's Nebraska Sandhills homestead which retains its original dwelling.

#### **Verbal Boundary Description**

The nominated area consists of the northeast ¼ of the southeast ¼ of the west ½ of the northwest ¼ and the southeast ¼ of the northwest ¼, lots 3 and 4 of Section 26 Township 21 North Range 18 West of the 6<sup>th</sup> Principle Meridian in Loup County, Nebraska.

#### **Boundary Justification**

The boundary encompasses the tract of land which contains the buildings historically associated with the farmstead.
