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The area of Solitary Cove or Little Neck, now called Morris Cove, was granted to Thomas Morris in 1671. One of the early settlers, he arrived in New Haven with his wife Elizabeth in 1638 with the group formed by John Davenport and Theophilus Eaton. Thomas died in 1673 and the land passed to his three sons, John, Eleazer, and Joseph. John and Eleazer began to buy more land in the Solitary Cove meadows and Indian lands as they bacame available. In 1705 John moved to New Jersey and sold his entire share of the farm to Eleazer; in the deed is mentioned "Ye mansion house now standing thereon". The house is undoubtedly somewhat earlier, for the stone ends show late 17th century work, and the oyster shells can be clearly seen in the mortar.

Eleazer had three sons, John, James, and Eleazer. John, in 1717, received that part of the farm on which stood the house and by 1744 owned the entire farm, having bought the remainder from his brother Eleazer. As John had no children, he left the property to James' children, Daniel and Amos. Daniel moved to Great Barrington, Massachusetts, and Amos became the sole owner. In 1767, Captain Amos Morris added the wing on the south side, with sandstone foundation, as distinguished from the granite of the main section.

On July 5, 1779, British troops under General Tryon invaded New Haven and burned all the homes on their line of march through Morris Cove. The Morris House was the first to be reached after they landed at Lighthouse Point. The stone ends and many of the heavy beams withstood the fire, and served as a beginning for the rebuilding by Amos in 1780 and 1781. A ballroom with vaulted ceiling was added either during this time or a few years later.

In all but two rooms the floors are wide pine boards. The frame of the house is white oak. The two southwest rooms on the first floor have fine stone fireplaces, one of which has a hand-hewn lintel, an oven, and a six-foot log capacity. The kitchen in the wing is now a dining room and the lower

part of two walls is of wide, horizontal wainscoting from the floor to the window sills, with rough sandstone above. At one time it was completely wainscoted.

In 1915 the property was to be sold. William Scranton Pardee of New Haven purchased it, but lived there only three years. Upon his death, it was left to the New Haven Colony Historical Society with an endowment for its maintenance.
