NARRATIVE DESCRIPTION:

The Ashley shanty and privy are located in the Pukwana vicinity, Cleveland Township, Brule County, South Dakota. The area is covered by gently rolling fields with shelterbelt rows protecting farmsteads and fields. The Missouri River winds its way through this fertile farmland. The Ashley ranch consists of the contributing homestead shanty built circa 1903 and a WPA outhouse. It also has non-historic buildings including a calving barn and many miscellaneous outbuildings associated with farming.

Shanty

The shanty was constructed circa 1903 and measures 16 feet by 20 feet. The shanty is situated on a rock and cement foundation, has wood clapboard siding and a wooden shake roof with one chimney. The main portion of the shanty is a gable end building with a lean-to addition on the north side. The facade of the shanty features an entry door at the southeast corner with one two-over-two window in the gable portion and one two-over-two window in the lean-to portion. There is an opening in the gable peak for a window but currently none is present. The south elevation has one two-over-two double hung window in the center of the elevation. The west elevation has one two-over-two double hung window in the lean-to addition. Finally, the north elevation has no opening or ornamentation.

The interior of the shanty is very simple. The gabled portion of the home is one room with stairs leading to the second floor room. The kitchen is located in the main portion of the homestead shanty. The home still retains its original wood windows and many of the original wall coverings.

Privy

The privy is located behind the main house and was a WPA project. The floor is marked with the date of 1940. Electricity was added to the privy in 1975. It is a simple five feet by five feet building that is clad in wood clapboards and an asphalt shingle roof. The only openings are on the east elevation and include one door and a small window opening at the eave line.

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NARRATIVE STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Ashley Farmstead in Cleveland Township in Brule County, was originally settled in1903 at which time H.G. and Bertha Stark were the owners. It is one of the largest intact farmsteads in the area with many outbuildings that have been moved onto the site. The shanty and privy are significant under criterion C for their architecture. The privy is also significant under criterion A for its role in social history.

The source of economic activity for the Pukwana area is mainly livestock and crop production. The Ashley Farmstead is an example of the farms that flourished in Brule County. Although Ashley's farm was comprised primarily of stockyards, they practiced diversified farming, including raising cattle, horses and crops.

In July of 1906, Thomas and Rachel Ashley purchased two quarters of a section of land, 320 acres, from H.G. Stark for \$6,500.00. The shanty located on the Ashley property was built circa 1903. It is probable that H.G. Stark built the shanty shortly after he purchased the property. In 1906, Stark, a widower by this time, sold the land to the Ashley's. It is likely that Stark, since he did not own the property very long, did not fulfill his responsibilities mandated by the Homestead Act. The Ashley's took over where Stark left off and continued to fulfill the requirements of the Homestead Act. According to Thomas Ashley's descendants, the shanty was used as the main place of residence until the current home was moved onto the property from Kimball circa 1944. At this time, Garnard, one of the sons, moved into the main house. Rachel Ashley, the mother of Garnard, lived in the shanty until her death in 1968.

The shanty and privy are significant under criterion C for their architectural merit. The shanty was the first building constructed on the Ashley farmstead. It is a representative type, which very few remain in the State of South Dakota. A claim shanty size was typically 10 x 12 feet according to Edith Eudora Kohl's *Land of the Burnt Thigh*. These dimensions were required by federal legislation. The Ashley shanty is 20 feet by 16 feet, which exceeded federal regulations. While the Ashley's were not the original homesteaders, they did comply with many of the federal regulations that were required of homesteaders. The Ashley's were the first to utilize the land, two previous owners had done little to develop the property. Most importantly, the shanty remains on its original location. Many shanties

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that remain in the State of South Dakota have been moved around the property or moved to a different site. The interior of the shanty still has many of its original wall coverings.

The privy is significant as it was constructed as part of the WPA projects completed in the State of South Dakota. It is a standard wood frame constructed privy with a small square window that is a distinctive feature of the WPA era privies. The privy is a representative type that was once located throughout the State of South Dakota. According to the *Federal Relief Construction in South Dakota, 1929-1941 MPL*, roughly \$62 million was spent on WPA construction projects in South Dakota. Of that, only 2.8% was spent on sanitation (sanitation excludes water and sewage). The WPA era privy also meets National Register Criterion A for its association with the Depression-era federal relief programs that resulted in the construction of numerous privies between 1929-1942 for improvement of sanitary conditions in areas that were still lacking these resources.

The shanty and privy located on the Ashley Farmstead are significant for their architectural merit; the shanty because it is an early building form that remains on its original location and the privy because it was constructed in the WPA era. Under the state *Homesteading and Agricultural Context*, the shanty is significant at the state level because "homesteading is a significant event in the history of South Dakota as it was a phenomenon that led to the permanent settlement of the state." (pg. 33) The privy is also significant for social history because sanitary projects in South Dakota during the depression era only constituted 2.8% of all projects in the state.



Verbal Boundary Description

The boundary is an imaginary line encompassing only the shanty and privy. Starting at a point 3 feet northeast of the northeast corner of the shanty the line runs west to a point 3 feet west of the western edge of the privy, the boundary then runs south to a point 3 feet southwest of the southwest corner of the privy, it then runs east to a point 3 feet southeast of the southeast corner of the privy, it then goes north to a point 1 foot north of the northern edge of the main house, the boundary then turn east and runs to a point 3 feet southeast of the southeast corner of the shanty, the boundary then runs north to its original starting point. Boundary Justification

The boundary includes the shanty and privy that has historically been part of the Ashley Farmstead and that maintain historic integrity. The rest of the property has been excluded based on dates of construction, the structures being moved onto the site and lack of historic integrity. See map.
