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
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
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

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STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This house is significant because of the individuals associated with it. Prince Archille Murat, nephew of Napoleon Bonaparte, was the son of Joachim Murat and Napoleon's youngest sister, Caroline. His father and mother were proclaimed King and Queen of Naples by Napoleon for his father's military service as a general. Prince Murat came to America to live with his Uncle Joseph, Napoleon's brother, in New Jersey. He made his way to Florida first settling in St. Augustine then to Tallahassee where he married a great-grand niece of George Washington, Catherine Daingerfield Willis. They had a plantation home called "Lipona" near Wacissa in Jefferson County, where they entertained the most prominent personages in the territory. After the Prince's death in 1847, the Princess "Kate" acquired the 500 acre plantation and home from her sister and named it Bellevue after a hotel in Belgium where she and the Prince spent many happy months. She was active in behalf of the Confederacy during the Civil War. slaves were so devoted they refused to leave her even after Shortly before her death in 1867, whe was awarded a small income by the French government.

Located on the grounds of the Tallahassee Junior Museum and utilized as a house museum, the Murat House is open and accessible to the public during regular visiting hours.

Restoration of the building is complete and was accurately executed in every detail. Necessary research and careful planning and supervision produced one of the finest and most accurate restorations in Florida. As it presently exists and originally appeared, the building is typical of the central hall, double pen, Creole-type of house which is occassionally seen in North Florida (west of Pensacola). It is a type of house which was brought into Florida via the Gulf coast and emerged into the Classic Revival style frequently seen in the rural panhandle. The Murat house, with its incised porches front and rear, is a particularly fine example of the style and can easily be compared with such buildings as the LaValle House in Pensacola, although its date is slightly later. The house is two-stories with pitched roof and external brick chimneys. The roof extends to cover the porches with no pent employed as in later, similar house types. Plain square columns, frieze and cornice characterize the fivebay porch with entry in the central bay and one 6/6 double-hung sash window per bay. In all cases, the simplest surrounds and exterior details are employed. There are four sash windows per elevation on the north and south sides of the house flanking the chimney. Porches, front and rear, are identical in size and detail. Exterior siding is horizontal and lapped on side elevations and laid flush within the porch area. The house rests on brick
