Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Description

The Norman house is located on the northwest corner of North Main and Second Streets and adjacent to the Colbert County Courthouse National Register District. Two large magnolia trees provide the only unique landscape features.

The structure appears to have originally consisted of an "L-shaped" one-story frame dwelling with a central pedimented portico supported by four boxed columns of the Tuscan style on both the east and south sides. A detached kitchen and other auxiliary buildings were located in the back yard. The floor plan consisted of four main rooms and the central entrance hall on the east side. Soon after the house was constructed, a shed-roofed "L-shaped" addition approximately 11 1/2' in width was added on the north and west sides at the rear. Probably around 1922 when the property changed hands the roofline was changed with the south and east main roofs being extended and the crest raised so that the new roof covered the later "L-shaped" addition. Around the same time the north and south walls of the east entrance hall were moved so as to widen the space by almost 7'; narrow heart pine floors were laid over the original 4" width boards; many doorways, including the east and south entrances, had French doors installed to replace the solid panel doors; the multi-paned lower sashes of most windows were replaced with solid panes; and a shed-roofed porch was added on the north side at the rear door. The last addition saw the construction of a shed-roofed bathroom in the west side of the rear "L".

The recent restoration removed the latest "L-shaped" addition consisting of porch and bathroom, but retained practically all of the remaining changes the house had undergone through the years.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

ARCHITECTURE

The Norman house is one of, if not the finest surviving one-story Greek revival cottage in Tuscumbia, where many formerly existed. It is the only one with porticoes on two sides-both street sides-and the only one with tri-partite windows-flanking each portico. The interior retains most of its original woodwork consisting of: Greek-ear door and window facings for the rooms on the east side; simple raised mouldings surrounding plain board facings for the two rear rooms; one original mantel of the Greek-ear design; five doors, one having two vertical panels, the other four having three horizontal panels in the upper part and two vertical panels in the lower; baseboards in all original spaces appear to be of multi-layered mouldings, but were constructed of one large board. While the 20th century changes in the roofline and the entrances alter somewhat the appearance of the Norman house, it still retains most of its original elements and sustains its architectural integrity.

It was probably built around 1851 for Felix Grundy Norman. Mr. Norman was a well-known practicing attorney in Tuscumbia from 1841 until his death in 1885. He was mayor of Tuscumbia for many years and a state legislator for the years 1841-45 and 1847-48. From 1845 to 1847 he was Master of the Grand Lodge of Freemasons in Alabama. Mr. Norman's wife, Jane L., was a sister of Mrs. Amanda Barton, who with her husband Armistead Barton, built Barton Hall near Cherokee. The father of these sisters was Henry Cook, the U. S. Land Agent who handled the sale of all the lands in the Chickasaw Cession of 1833.
