DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Westfield Fire House is located at 405 North Avenue West in the Central Business District. The building was constructed in 1911 and since that time has been occupied by the Westfield Fire It is a two story brick structure with a four story Department. The exterior is well proportioned and carefully deside tower. Its overhanging eaves carried completely around the build-duce a neat simple appearance. The roof is tile. Windows tailed. ing produce a neat simple appearance. have carefully articulated brick arches over them and the bell tower designed and so located to produce a graceful architectural composition. The cupola, however, was destroyed by lightning and replaced by a radio antenna. Also, the original swing out decorative wood doors were changed to steel to accommodate modern fire fighting equipment. These changes do not detract seriously from the original design.

The street facade has four engine bays on the first floor. There is a single wide entrance door in the rear to originally simplify re-entry into the firehouse when horse-drawn fire aparatus was utilized. The small four inch square blocks with deep grooves and runoff features provided easier maintenance and traction for the horses. The bays are divided by occasional columns.

The major room configurations of the second floor are intact. There is a fireman's exempt room, a kitchen, two bathrooms, and two activity rooms.

The interior of the building is essentially the same today as when it was built. The few minor changes made are a dropped ceiling added in the kitchen area, three slide poles blocked off and the original wood stairs are now of steel.

It is interesting to note, that the 30 inch wide flange structural steel members used in this building were among the first in this country of this depth, and were fabricated by Bethlehem Steel Company. The increased depth of these members over previous ones made possible increased spans in building construction, permitting a greater flexibility in future architectural design.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Showing influences of Spanish, Italianate and Mediterranean architecture, the Westfield Fire House is a fine example of 20th century civic architecture.

Westfield Fire Headquarters was recognized at the time of construction as one of the best appointed fire houses in the metropolitan area. It combines utilitarian usefulness with fine architectural features and has been a point of civic pride for many years. Touted as one of the "conveniences of a progressive and well ordered community and an ideal hometown" when built, the Westfield firehouse was an important factor in convincing people to this rapidly developing suburb.

The most obvious point of interest is the Tower, which is a reminder of fire-fighting practices of a bygone age. The Tower was used in the early 1900's to dry the cotton covered fire hoses before returning them to their storage area. The advent of polyester covered fire hoses (on which no fungus can grow) has obviated this practice.

From the very beginning the firehouse was a point of civic pride as evidenced by the "Westfield Leader." The issue dated May 17, 1911 prominently displays the firehouse in an article entitled "Boost Westfield." The delight that was manifest at the opening of the firehouse can be seen in the first paragraph of an article entitled "Banquet a Success at New Fire House" in the May 13, 1911 issue of the same publication. The first sentence of that article reads: "Monday, May 29, 1911 must be placed in Westfield's history as one of the most important dates of all time."

The article continues, "First, it marked the official opening of one of the handsomest firehouses in any town in this country. Secondly, it made clear that the men in the department are the finest to be obtained. In the third place, it marked the beginning of the era of new apparatus for Westfield, so that the town will be second to none of its size, and lastly, it brought together the official life of Westfield into one happy, congenial family such as has never been experienced before. Monday, May 29th, 1911 is an important date."

The "new apparatus" referred to in the above paragraph was "motor propelled apparatus" which would shortly replace the horse drawn equipment.

Architecture

"Charles H. Darsh (1869-1939) a native of Westfield, was educated in local schools. He studied architecture at Cooper Union and Atillee of Emanuel Masquereau. He was associated as a designer with the architects Bruce and Price of New York; Baldwin and Pennington of Baltimore. He maintained an office in Cranford, New Jersey and designed numerous public and commercial buildings throughout Union County.

Darsh was a member of the American Institute of Architects, the Gargoyles of New York; New York Sketch Club and the Rotary Club. He was a charter member of the Westfield Art Association being well known for his water colors, and attended the Presbyterian Church.
