DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Santa Maria Plantation consists of a main house, a cistern, an overseer's house, a double quarters type pigeonnier adjacent to the house which was reproduced from Ringrose Plantation. The immediate grounds are well planted with live oaks with open farm and pasture land beyond.

The thrust of the nomination is the architecture of the plantation house. So the boundaries of the nominated area were chosen to encompass the house and its setting which incudes the barn, the wooden sheds, the pigeonnier, the overseer's house, the double house and the cistern. The boundaries exclude lards not visable in the vicinity of the house of Perkins Road.

The main house is a raised gallery fronted, one-and-a-half story, four room plan plantation house, with a slightly off center entrance hall. The house dates from the 1870's, with several 20th century rear additions. The most important one was the filling in of the rear gallery between the kitchen and bathroom. It is probable that these two rooms are original to the house.

The house rests upon stuccoed brick piers with circular sawn beams, joists, and studs. Most of the clapboard exterior is original but the side walls appear to have been resheathed in the early 20th century.

The main feature of the house is the heavily proportioned Greek Revival gallery resting upon segmental arches which were probably inspired by the Renaissance Revival. Rural builder and architecture is indicated by:

1. The fact that the facade's five openings are out of kilter with the column placement on the gallery.

2. The inconsistent size of the arches below the gallery.

3. The crudeness and simplicity of the interior skirting boards, door frames and transoms.

4. The one remaining original mantel in the dining room with its simple Greek Revival styling.

5. Retardare nature of the house give the 1870's construction period.

Most of the floor boards, plaster and wall boards appear to be original. Many of the windows in the side walls have been replaced but in kind.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Santa Maria Plantation is one of only three extant Greek Revival Plantation houses in East Baton Rouge Parish. In addition, of these, Santa Maria has the most complete group of outbuildings. Its historical setting is therefore better conveyed than at Goodwood or Audubon where most of the outbuildings have been lost. Further, Santa Maria is the only Greek Revival raised plantation house in the parish. The house can be seen as an excellent example of the rural provincial Greek Revival plantation house. This is shown by its simple details, the way in which the gallery does not mesh well with the window pattern behind it, and the inconsistent size of the ground floor arches. In addition the fact that this apparently 1830's house was built in the late 1870's shows the strength of the Greek Revival raised plantation house tradition in rural Louisiana. It exemplifies, therefore, a part of the architectural history of the State.

On December 8, 1877, Mrs. Kate Andrews Knowlton, wife of Colonel Charles Knowlton, purchased the 570 acre tract of land which became Santa Maria Plantation.¹ According to the Knowltons' granddaughter, Mrs. Gladys Morrill, who often visited the place as a child, Colonel and Mrs. Knowlton came to Louisiana from California in the 1870's and bought the plantation. At that time there was already a small two-room house on the property. The Knowltons then built the main house, using the two rooms of the original house as a dining room and a kitchen, attaching them to the new building by a covered porch. The old part of the building, she said, was later demolished.²

There is not much readily-available information on the Knowltons. In the Civil War, Charles Knowlton was a captain in the Tenth Louisiana Infantry. He was captured and exchanged in 1862, and apparently later, was retired due to wounds. He was born in New York and was a clerk in New Orleans at the time of his enlistment. At that time he was not yet married to Kate Andrews.³

The 1880 census reveals a bit of information on the Knowltons and Santa Maria. Charles Knowlton listed his age as forty and his occupation as "Farmer." His wife, Kate, who according to the census "Keeps house", was thirty-two years old. They had a twelve-year-old son Charles and a ten-yearold daughter Inez. Also listed were two mulatto servants in their twenties, and their two young children.⁴ The agricultural census listed the Knowltons as having 740 acres of land, of which 440 were improved and 300 were woodland.

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The value of the farm, including land, fences, and buildings was given as \$3000. They owned \$150 worth of implements and machinery and \$800 worth of livestock. The Knowltons paid \$750 in wages for farm labor during 1879, and they had employed each laborer for forty-four weeks out of that year. The estimated value of all farm production for 1879 was \$2,100. Twelve acres planted in sugar cane in 1879 had yielded 17 hogsheads and 1200 gallons of molasses. Twenty acres planted in corn had yielded 750 bushels.⁵ The Louisiana Sugar Report for 1880-1881 listed the sugar crop of "Col. Charles Knollton" for that year as twenty hogsheads.⁶ Other available sugar reports frequently listed his name but gave no production figures. According to Mrs. Morrill. Colonel Knowlton converted Santa Maria to a cotton plantation in the 1890's, making the sugar house into a cotton gin. He did well, she said, until the coming of the boll weevil around 1900.⁷

In 1901 Colonel Knowlton, now a widower sold Santa Maria, and it passed through the hands of several owners until 1926, when it was purchased by Andrew Bradford Hagen and Mary Carrie Elder, who later sold her share to Hagen, who operated the Santa Maria Dairy there for many years. In the late 1950's, Mr. and Mrs. Verdie Reece Perkins purchased the property.⁸
