National Register Criteria Statement

The Spring Hill Historic District retains integrity of location, design, setting, materials, workmanship, feeling, and association. Somerville's largest and most intact pre-Civil War residential district, the neighborhood was a planned subdivision whose success was tied directly to the introduction of public transportation to Somerville in 1841. The development was financed by real estate speculator George Brastow and designed by well-known landscape architect Alexander Wadsworth. The district's most intensive period of development (ca. 1843-1870) was overlaid with subsequent growth as three-deckers were built as infill during the city's last phase of residential development (ca. 1885-1910). The Spring Hill Historic District thus fulfills criteria A and C of the National Register of Historic Places on the local level.

The Spring Hill Historic District, containing 69 properties, is of architectural significance for its well-conserved examples of Somerville's mid-nineteenth century residential styles. Most of the district's buildings were erected between 1845 and 1870. The area's original street plan, a grid on a sloping hill organized around Harvard Street is also intact. Views to Cambridge at the south - primarily of Harvard Yard - are uninterrupted, and the original space of the neighborhood is imagineable, if not completely intact.

The earliest buildings erected in the Historic District shortly after the area's initial subdivision were 8 double Greek Revival-style houses of which seven survive intact (46-48, 56-60, and 65-57 Atherton, 1-3 and 9-11 Harvard, and 23-25 and 31-33 Monmouth). All these houses were built ca. 1845-1848. The Frost-Swan House, 46-48 Atherton, is the least altered of the group, and retains its original windows, Doric-columned full width porch, and octagonal cupola centered on its gable ridge.

The 3-story Round House, 36 Atherton Street, is the architectural curiosity of the neighborhood. Built in 1856 by local inventor and locksmith Enoch Robinson, the house has a central hall lit by a glass-topped dome and surrounded by circular and oval rooms. The building is 40 feet in diameter; its third story is recessed behind a broken parapet, once trimmed with a cast-iron nail. The ornate window hoods and a bracketed entry portico supported by doric columns all survive.

By ca. 1860, Spring Hill's elevation and views were providing inspiration for the construction of villas and rustic cottages; the influence of landscape architect Andrew Jackson Downing can be seen in the now altered Italian Villa at 9 Monmouth Street and 3 Gothic Revival cottages on Spring Street. The H. P. Osgood House, 15 Spring Street, (ca. 1854) retains its cusped bargeboard. The influence of the Gothic Revival remains as well in the building's steeply pitched cross-gable roof and tall, narrow window openings.

The John Wood House, 47 Spring Street (ca. 1860), probably built on speculation by Enoch Robinson, is one of Somerville's best-preserved example of a high-style side-hall-plan Italianate house. The 2 1/2-story house is sited with its gable end to the street. An octagonal cupola on the ridge and loggia along the southern elevation once afforded views of Cambridge. Other notable

features include double entrance doors with glass panes, and several polygonal bays and round-headed windows. Wooden ornamentation survives throughout: cornice brackets, decorative molding, and recessed door panelling.

In the late-19th century, the last group of single-family buildings were constructed within the district. Examples of the then-popular Shingle and Queen Anne styles, they include the Edward Crane House, 152 Summer Street (1895), the only residence in the district known to be the work of a recognized architect. Designed by George A. Loring, of the popular Boston firm of Loring and Phipps, the Crane House features both Queen Anne and Shingle Style details. Loring, a Somerville resident, was the designer of approximately 100 residences in Somerville, few of which survive. Key features of the Crane House include the cross-gable design, conical corner turret containing an open first-floor entrance porch, and panelled, threaded chimney on the facade.

The Christopher Rymes House, 49 Spring Street, built ca. 1890, may also be the work of Loring. It is most notable for the sunburst motif adorning its dormer gables.

The Spring Hill Historic District includes those properties which are well preserved examples of Somerville's mid-nineteenth century residential trends. The District is an example of the patterns of subdivision that occurred over time in Somerville. As the population grew, larger estates accommodated the construction of two and three unit housing within their boundaries, thereby decreasing open spaces of the area.

The Spring Hill Historic District is bounded to the northernmost corner by the intersection of Summer Street and Spring Street. It includes the buildings along Spring Street to the west, running until the intersection of Atherton Place and Spring Street at its southwesterly corner. Phillips Place, at the intersection of Atherton Place and Spring Street has one property inclusion, map number 63. The boundary continues at its southmost along Atherton Place, includes the grammar school and crosses Cleveland Place to Harvard Street at the northeast, where the boundary runs northerly until it intersects Monomouth Place, excludes number 10 Monomouth Place as it runs easterly to Central Street, where it runs north to Summer Street.

Historical Significance

The Spring Hill Historic District is Somerville's largest and most intact early-19th century residential district. Its earliest suburban phase (ca. 1843-1870), related to horsecar and passenger rail service, is overlaid with subsequent development from the streetcar era.

At one hundred and thirty-seven feet above sea level, Spring Hill reportedly derives its name from a spring which was located along the glacial drumlin or hill which runs between Lowell and Cedar Streets in the vicinity of Summer Street. As part of the 17th century Stinted Common, the area provided excellent farmsites for Charlestown residents in the 18th and early-19th centuries. Farming, particularly the raising of dairy cattle and hay, was carried on until the Civil War. Market gardening, including the raising of fruit, could be found on Spring Hill until about 1890.

In the 1840s, however, with the arrival of passenger rail service, via a station at the foot of the hill, the southern slope became an increasingly desirable site for the construction of Boston and Charlestown businessmen's homes.

One of the first Somerville residents to see the residential potential of this area was George O. Brastow. Brastow, a State Senator and eventually the first Mayor of Somerville (1872-73). He was listed in the 1851 Somerville Directory as a "dealer in real estate," the only person then listed with such a title. Born in Wrentham, Massachusetts, he came to Somerville in 1838, while it was still a portion of Charlestown. He settled on a large tract of Spring Hill and built a spacious, porticoed Greek Revival house near the intersection of Summer and Central Streets. In 1843, he hired surveyor Alexander Wadsworth of Boston to plot a section of the hill, including present-day Harvard Street and several short courts, now corresponding to Monmouth Street, Harvard Place, Elm Place, Atherton and Beech Streets. The land had formerly been part of the Kent Estate and was used as grazing land. Wadsworth's past work included Mt. Auburn Cemetery, Cambridge, the nation's first picturesque garden cemetery (1832) and several curvilinear suburban tracts in Newton and Watertown. On Spring Hill, Wadsworth chose a gridlike plan. A small slate outcropping was quarried at the southwest corner. The building of the Middlesex Bleachery and Dye Works was situated at the foot of the subdivision on Somerville Avenue. Nearby, train and horsecar service connected with Boston.

Wadsworth's rectilinear plan provided seventy-two excellent building sites, averaging 50 X 100 feet, with views of Harvard College and Cambridge to the south, and the rapidly developing industrial and commercial corridor along Somerville's Cambridge border. By 1850, there was a collection of fine double Greek Revival houses in the Spring Hill subdivision. Each of the original eight houses had a seven-columned Doric portico, with a central cupola atop the ridgepole.

Directories reveal that the first residents of the Brastow subdivision were businessmen, produce dealers, provision suppliers, and local manufacturers were also residents. The subdivision attracted the builders of other architecturally interesting houses, including inventor Enoch Robinson. Robinson's 1856 Round House as the corner of Atherton and Beech Streets, which became an instant object of curiosity in Somerville and throughout the Boston area.

In later years, the area continued to attract business people, as well as professionals and artisans. Most were employed outside Somerville. With the flight of many of Somerville's elite at the turn of the century, a pattern observable throughout the eastern portion of the city, Spring Hill experienced the subdivision of the largest estates and the construction of three-deckers and apartment buildings. This produced the density which exists today.

The Brastow subdivision was also the site of what is now the Spring Hill School, constructed shortly after Somerville was set off from Charlestown in 1842. The school site also accommodated the now-razed First Baptist Church (1852) and eventually, the Renaissance Revival-style Martin S. Carr School (1898) which has recently been rehabilitated for use as apartments. The three-story brick and granite Carr School was the first H-plan school in Somerville. Its modern plan allowed maximum light and air into its fourteen classrooms. When it opened, the school was one of 24 in the city and accommodated 700 pupils. As Somerville's school population rose from 40,152 in 1890 to 61,643 in 1900, the school was already overcrowded as noted in a school report of 1901.

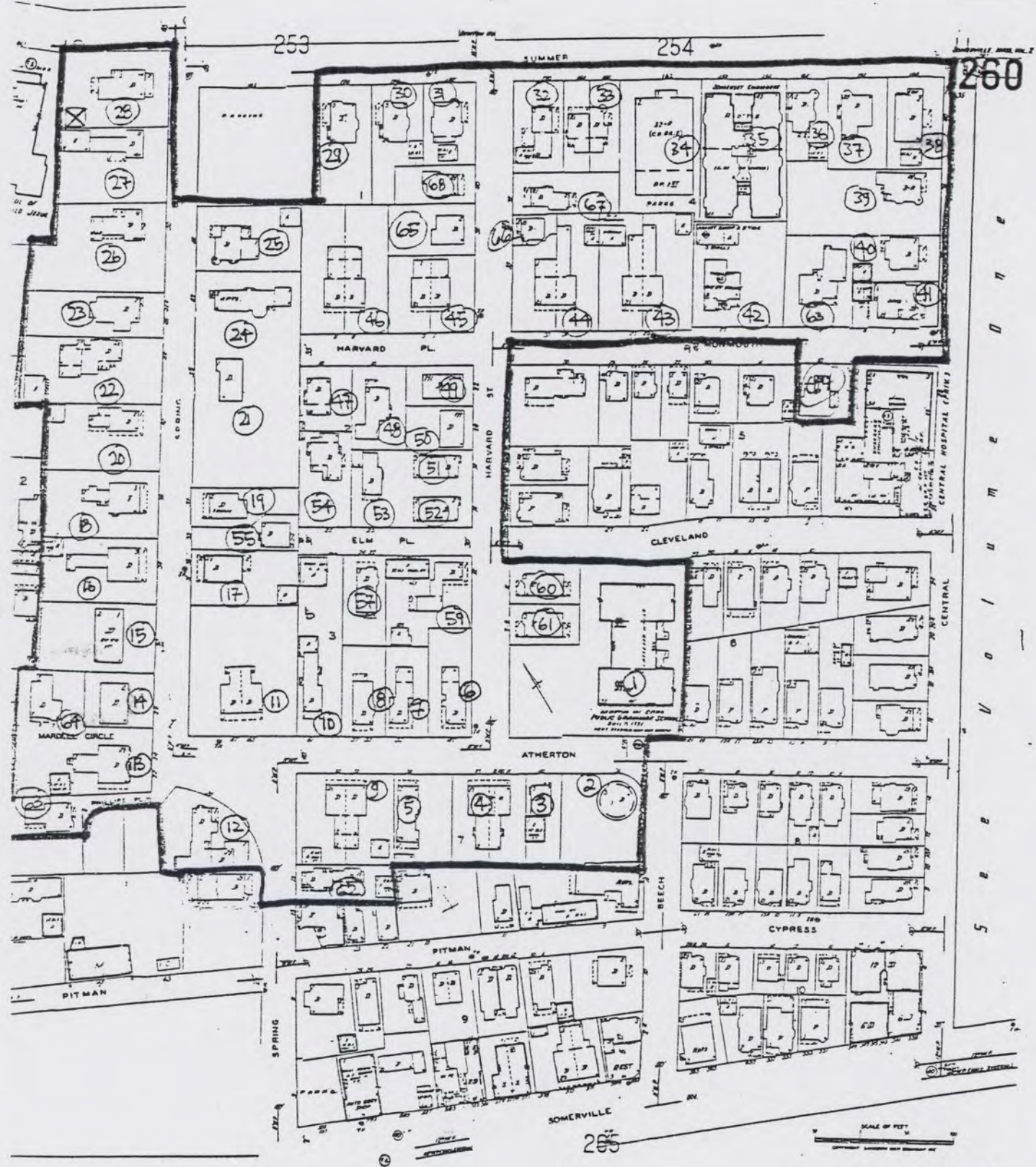
