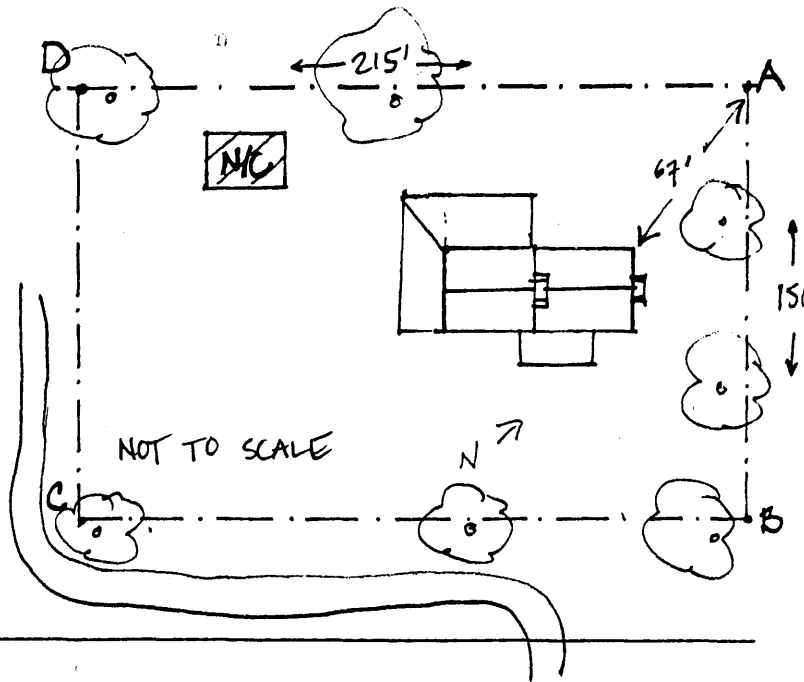

44. Site Plan (and boundary description and justification for N.R. sites):

Beginning at A, where two fences intersect, SE 150' to B, thence SW 215' to C, thence 150' NW to D, thence 215' to point of origin. Boundaries were chosen to encompass the domestic space enclosed by fences on all four sides and marked by trees along the fence lines. Included is one non-contributing outbuilding.

Point A is 67 feet from the north (rear right) corner of the house.



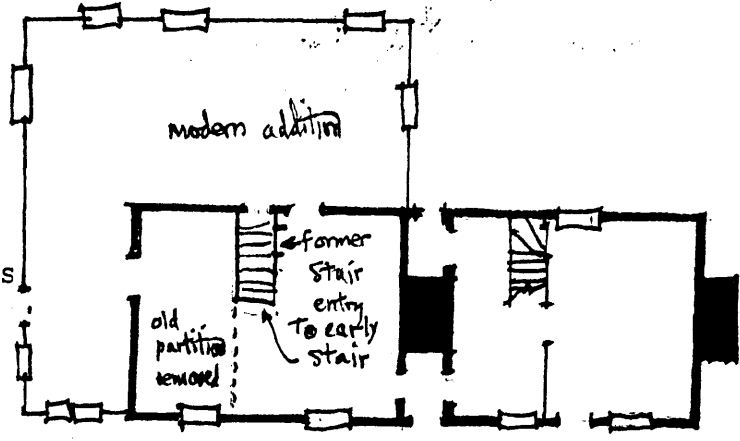
45. Description and House Plan:

Exterior

Consists of two 1 3/4-story rectangular, V-notched log pens with exterior stone end chimneys, 1-story shed-roofed addition on west end wrapping around rear of west pen, eastern building covered with asbestos siding, 20th century shed-roofed porch over eastern pen on front, central door blocked up under siding on western pen; pens probably built at separate times, tapered rake boards.

Interior

Both pens were originally two-room, hall-parlor, west pen measures 18'x24' with partition removed, original entrance to enclosed corner stair in NW blocked, access now through rear addition, east pen measures 18'x20', partition remains, lath removed from ceiling in both rooms, whitewash remains on ceiling in west room and rafters are beaded in east room, original batten door leading into east room, door cut in west wall of west room by present owners.



Outbuildings:

Included is one non-contributing outbuilding.

The nominated area includes one contributing and one non-contributing building.

rectangular two-room pens. Evidence suggests the existence of 3 other foundations located at each end of the existing structure and to the southwest. The unusual pairing of two hall-parlor houses and the individual form of each element, as well as many internal and external details, remain intact in spite of alterations (siding) and a modern addition.
