Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Corey House was built in 1899, the Corey Hotel (three feet to the south) in 1909. Both are two-story frame affairs, roughly alike in size (the house 28 x 39 feet, the hotel 24 x 36 feet). A gingerbreaded porch ties them together on the East. Outside walls are covered with lapsiding, interior with lathe and plaster.

The house has living room, dining room, kitchen, and one bedroom downstairs, two bedrooms upstairs with a large loft. The adjacent hotel had a lobby, dining room, and two bedrooms downstairs, six bedrooms on the second floor. Stairs faced the center front door in both buildings. Interesting "preservation" note: Windows in the hotel's upstairs windows still have their iron ring, screwed into the frame, the better to use for tying a sheet onto in case of a fire! The six rooms themselves boast their original beds, dressers, and chairs.

A grand-daughter has left this interesting picture of what was involved in running a turn-of-the-century boarding house. "Mother did all the cooking and I waited tables and did other work. We had a well on the porch on the north side of the dining room. We cooked on a wood stove and had a wood stove in the front room. Mother served all the big shots of our county... Since there was no refrigeration one of us went to the meat market south of the park square and bought meat each day. Mother made lots of her bread and bought butter from country women. When they came with the butter, my mother would fix them something to eat. Free, of course."

Remarkably, much of this ambience remains because so much of the physical setting for it has survived the ravages of the past three quarters of a century. Inside and out, the Corey House/Hotel has been amazingly well preserved - including the original sign: COREY HOTEL / CLEAN ROOMS 50¢ A NIGHT.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Taken together - the Corey House and adjacent Corey Hotel - provided a remarkably authentic picture of small town innkeeping in Oklahoma in the early years of the 20th century. C. H. Corey came to Indian Territory in 1891, built his two-story frame house in 1899. Mrs. Corey promptly made it a boarding house, charging 25 cents for a meal and renting an occasional bed for 50 cents. The food was apparently good. By 1909 business was brisk enough that Mr. Corey built the Corey House a few feet to the south. It, too, was a two-story frame affair, almost identical to his house. The two buildings were operated together by the Corey family as a boarding house/hotel for another 40 years. And they stand today pretty much as they always have, well cared for, many of the rooms boasting original furniture and furnishings.

In the small town of Grove - established in 1889 and still having a population of less than 2,000 - the Corey House/Hotel was a center of social and commercial activity for more than a half century. Strategically located on Main Street, with the depot a block to the north and other businesses to the south, it continued to operate long after most similar establishments had closed shop. In the years that followed retained family ownership, a growing awareness of traditional values, and perhaps a modicum of nostalgic sentimentality, have all conspired to assure its preservation. Today the plan of the three heir/owners is to restore it and make it available to the public as a tribute to their grandparents and an authentic memorial to the turn-of-the-century small town boarding house.
