Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The Caguas City Hall is a two-storey brick and masonry building completed in 1887. It is an "Isabelino" neoclassical style administrative building. Its main facade design makes it stand out from the urban landscape, thus impossing its function symbolically on the viewer.

Its main facade is articulated horizontally into a ground level and a principal upper story by a cornice at the top of the upper floor and a string course between floors one and two. This facade displays a classical, symmetrical, tripartite organization of seven bays in an A-B-A rythm. It has an emphasized three-bay central section, and two flanking double-bay sections. It central section is emphasized by a triangular pediment which crowns it, and by a three-bay projecting balcony that spans it horizontally at the second floor. The balcony projects from the facade, is adorned with wrought iron railings and is supported by decorative iron brackets.

Rusticated quions mark the corners of the facade. The building's central section bays are emphasized on its two floors by a series of pilasters consisting of two single pilasters, flanking the center bay, and double pilasters at each end of the section. The pilasters support the string course and cornice at the first and second floors respectively. At the upper story the cornice supports a parapet wall above.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

Caguas was founded officially in 1775. Its rapid growth during the XIX century made it one of the largest and most important local government centers in the central region of the island, a position which it still enjoys.

In 1856 due to the town's growth new government facilities were needed and thus the construction of the new City Hall began. Due to the financial difficulties it was not completed until 1887. The building was designed and built by the Spanish Royal Corps of Engineers, who were responsible for most of the island's public buildings, churches and defense systems. In this particular case they designed a structure that would serve as a true government center. The building had to house not only the Mayor's offices and the Municipal Assembly but also the local jail house, the public library, the first public elementary school, and the spanish military post.

This building was designed in the popular "Neoclásico Isabelino" style and it was the best example of this type in the area of Caguas. It has an elegant severe main facade which stands out amidst the surrounding urban streetscape. The use of a central triangular pediment crowning the entablature and the use of central balcony over the main entrance reflects the function for which it was built. This City Hall is the only remaining example of Spanish civil architecture in the Caguas Urban core.

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Bays of each level are differentiated from those of the other. At the upper level, bays are articulated with segmental arches and at the first floor as round arches. Central section arches display at section bays at the first floor and second floor bays house double jaulosies.

The building's floor plan is rectangular. At the interior of the building a "Y" type gallery serves on both floor as circulation space. A modified "T" shaped mahogany and concrete stairway connects the two floors. This stairway is located in the main lobby. It was remodeled during the 1960's when the original tiles were changed to terazzo tiles.

At the center of the main lobby there is a brick well which was sealed during the 1960's for safety purposes.

The building is still in use for administration purposes. Most spaces contain administrative offices, nevertheless, there are also reunion halls: on the first floor, the Luis Muñoz Marín Hall, and on the second, the "Salón Herradura" (Horseshoe Hall) maintains its original furniture, that includes a "horseshoe" shaped mahogany table after which the hall is named. This room is the Municipal Assembly reunion hall.

The structure has suffered some interior and rear facade alteration. New office areas have been created in order to meet the growing needs of the City Hall. These alterations do not affect the architectural integrity of the building. United States Department of the Interior National Park Service



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As center of the local government this building has witnessed the making of many laws in its one hundred and one years of existence. From its offices the destiny of Caguas has been guided very positively making it the most important city in the central region of the Island. Since it is still the center of for local government and a place were very important decisions are taken we are choosing an arbitrary date of fifty years ago (1938) to end the period of significance for the area of politics/government, this date may be reviewed at a future period.
