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Narrative Description

The Harrison DeLong House is located in Sioux Falls, the largest city in the State of South Dakota, in the middle of the block. It is located in a residential neighborhood and the surrounding homes have been converted to apartments with newer apartment buildings on the block as well. The house was constructed in 1889 in the Queen Anne style, a popular building style in the State of South Dakota.

The façade (east elevation) of the DeLong House reflects typical Queen Anne design. It has a full porch, varied wall surfaces and turret. The house has a rough faced quartzite foundation and an asphalt shingled roof. The turret is located at the southeast corner of the side gable house. Narrow columns support the roof of the porch and rest on a porch rail clad in wood shingles. There is a set of three columns at each corner with two columns on either side of the steps leading to the front door. To the north of the entry door is a Queen Anne window surrounded with simple window trim. The entire first floor of the DeLong House is clad in wood clapboards with a simple wood band separating the first and second floors. Located above the porch is a through gable dormer. The dormer has two, one-over-one double hung windows with two columns on either side. The eave of the dormer has dentil moldings. The eave also has four brackets. Located in the peak of the dormer is a small fixed window.

The turret has three one-over-one double hung windows on the first floor. There are three one-overone double hung windows on the second floor with a smaller fixed window located on the second floor of the turret as well. The eave has decorative dentil moldings. The turret is topped by a conical roof.

The first floor of the south elevation has three one-over-one double hung windows. The second floor has three one-over-one double hung windows in a band. The second floor and attic space, divided by a decorative wood band, has a wall surface of wood shingles. The southwest end of the gable has a gable return.

The west elevation (rear) of the DeLong House has a small shed roof entry addition on the first floor. The first floor has a two one-over-one double hung windows to the north of the entry. The shed roof entry addition has a small fixed window on the north and south wall and a single entry door on the NPS FORM 10-900-A (8-86)

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west elevation. There is a single, one-over-one double hung window in the gable end with a decorative wood band above and below the window.

The north elevation has two one-over-one double hung windows on both the first and second floors. The second floor has a gable return at the northwest corner.

Interior:

Original woodwork can be found throughout the house. Twelve light, french doors lead into the study. Wood panel pocket doors are between the parlor and sitting room. The only alterations to the interior includes a drop ceiling in the kitchen to allow for new wiring and renovating the butlers pantry into a laundry facility.

Garage

There is a non-contributing garage at the rear of the property.

Statement of Significance

The Harrison DeLong House is eligible for the National Register of Historic Places under Criterion C as it is an fine example of Queen Anne architecture in Sioux Falls. It exhibits many distinctive characteristics of the Queen Anne style. The building is a well-preserved example of Queen Anne architecture. The DeLong House continues to provide a sense of architectural appeal that made it noteworthy in 1889.

The Harrison DeLong House was constructed in 1889 in a popular architectural style for its time. Queen Anne style architecture is characterized by steeply pitched roofs of irregular shape with dominant front-facing gables, pattern shingles, cutaway bay windows, and other devices used to avoid a smooth wall appearance. The DeLong house has a side gable roof with a turret at the southeast corner creating an irregular appearance compared to the surrounding buildings. It uses wood shingles as a decorative element on the wall surface. Differing wall textures are a key element in Queen Anne style houses. This is commonly achieved with pattern wood shingles or differing patterns of bricks. Typical Queen Anne houses have an asymmetrical facade with partial or full-width NPS FORM 10-900-A (8-86)

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porch which is usually one story high and extended along one or both side walls. The DeLong house utilizes these elements as well. Queen Anne was the dominant style of architecture from 1880-1900 and persisted with decreasing popularity through the first decade of the 20th century. In the western part of the United States, the style increases in dominance.

Most importantly, the Harrison DeLong House is in an area that was once full of single family dwellings and now is surrounded by modern apartment complexes. The houses that remain on the block have been converted into multiple family dwellings. It remains as the sole single family dwelling on the block.

The Harrison DeLong House is eligible for the National Register of Historic Places under criterion C as a well-preserved example of a Queen Anne style house. As it is surrounded by modern apartment complexes and single family dwellings that have been converted into multiple family units, it is significant for its integrity within its local setting. The DeLong House continues to reflect the architectural elements that made it a significant house in the late 1800's.
