DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The imposing Levi H. Manning House stands on 10.3 acres at the southwestern corner of the El Presidio District on the quiet curve of Paseo Redondo. The original layout included a rectangular 10-room main house connected by an arched loggia to a utility wing. These elements created a central patio.

The house is stuccoed brick on a rock foundation. The plan is accented by three towers: a large round single-story in the center of the south facade and two smaller, two-story towers at the northeast corner of the main house and the northeast corner of the utility wing. The base of the large tower forms a porch and another porch is centered on the east side of the main house. Both porches have pillars and arches. The south porch has a painted ceiling decorated with birds and flowers by a local artisan. Both porches are floored with decorative tile.

Tower windows are arched but the others have heavy flat projecting lintels and lugsills. The upper windows of the smaller towers have pilastered arches and the lower ones have keystone arches. Openings are accented by narrow horizontal grilled windows above. Some of the larger windows have iron grills, too. The flat roof has a low parapet and the towers have denticulated cornices. The original floor plan included four bedrooms, two baths, a dressing room, a breakfast room, a kitchen, a dining room, a living room, a library, and a reception area.

Alterations and additions were made after the BPOE acquired the property in 1950 from the Manning heirs. A west wing was added and the loggia was enclosed. Additions were made on the north and west sides of the utility wing. More recently, brick pillars were added to mark the gates in the old cobble wall along the east side of the property.

The utility wing originally contained two garages, a laundry, a store room, a dark room, an office, two bedrooms, and a bath.

The patio has been closed in and the two buildings are now one. The east and south facades are relatively unaltered. The building now includes offices, lounges, a lodge room, a dining hall, a kitchen, and recreation rooms.

Some original interior features remain such as two fireplaces, a marble one in what was the southwest bedroom and a copper one in what was the living room. The living room also has the original beamed ceilings but the redwood paneling has been covered with new paneling. Other ceilings were lowered when air conditioning was installed.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Levi H. Manning House, 9 Paseo Redondo, was built in 1907-08 by Levi Howell Manning, prominent Tucson civic leader and entrepreneur. Manning was born in Halifax County, North Carolina on May 18, 1864, but was raised in Mississippi, where his family had been established for some time and his father was a Congressman.

After completing his education at the University of Mississippi, Manning went west, arriving in Tucson in 1884. One of his first jobs was as a reporter for the local newspaper. Later he was manager of the Ice & Electric Company for two years. He also served a while as mineral clerk for the U.S. Surveyor General's office in Tucson. In 1893, he was appointed Surveyor General for Arizona by President Grover Cleveland, a position he held for four years. For the rest of his life he was often referred to as "General" Manning.

By 1900, Manning had acquired a considerable fortune and was well-immersed in mining, commercial, and real estate ventures. In 1904, he was the lead partner in building the Santa Rita Hotel and had constructed several other buildings and houses in Tucson. He was also active in civic affairs and served as mayor (1905-06) after being elected on an anti-gambling platform. In 1908, he acquired the street car company and the gas and electric company. He reorganized the companies and sold them to a Denver corporation.

That same year, Manning moved into his grand new home on Paseo Redondo, built for a reported cost of \$10,000. He and Leo Goldschmidt developed this new subdivision of fine homes on land sometimes referred to as the Santa Cruz flats, since it is a fertile area nearer the river and lower than the bench on which the main part of town then stood. The flats had been used as pasture land in the 1860s and later were used by Chinese for vegetable gardens.

Manning continued to be involved in a great variety of business, agricultural, and mining enterprises both in Arizona and Sonora. Two of his younger brothers began their business careers in association with him. His only son, Howell, was manager of the historic Canoa Ranch which Manning acquired and increased to 500,000 acres. On this and other ranches, Manning pioneered in raising Herefords and fine saddle horses.

Manning's other enterprises included a commission brokerage house, which he owned from 1900 to 1930, a long term contract to furnish labor to the Southern Pacific Railroad for the territory from El Paso to Seattle, and oil wells near Long Beach, California.

The Manning House was a showplace in Tucson, with its distinctive architecture and ten acres of trees and gardens. It was the scene of many festive occasions, including

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a huge garden party given each year on Manning's birthday. The "General" died of pneumonia August 1, 1935 at his summer home in Beverly Hills and was buried in Tucson.

The Elks Club purchased the building in 1950 for its Tucson Lodge 385 and has since made several modifications, including the additions of the Lodge Hall, main dining room, and the recreation room. On March 20, 1979, the Elks Club sold the building and its grounds to the City of Tucson. See Exhibit "A".

The city will be reselling the property as part of a Downtown Development Project, with certain restrictions requiring compatible use and the building's preservation.
