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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Bethel College Administration Building in North Newton, Kansas, is an irregular T-shaped structure, three stories in height and with a full basement. The building faces south with the stem of the "T" in a northerly direction. The main portion of the building is approximately 116 feet long and 54 feet wide with an overall height of 50 feet. The north wing is 30 feet by 40 feet. Exterior walls are constructed of rough faced native stone laid in uniform horizontal courses, which alternate vertically between wide and narrow. Stone lengths are random. The first floor is raised several feet above the ground and is marked around the perimeter of the building by a smooth stone belt line.

The roof form is a moderately steep hip covered with wood shingles. An ornamental cornice separates the roof from the stone walls. Dual semicircular towers are placed at the corners of the north wing and extend the full building height to the roof line. Cone-shaped roofs crown both towers. Two towers flank the main entrance on the south facade. The west tower is semicircular in form and is detailed similar to the north towers. The east tower, which is octagonal, extends above the main roof line and terminates in a pointed octagonal roof.

The basement windows are located directly below the smooth stone belt line which serves as the lintel. These windows are simple rectangles with stone sills and no special decoration. Windows on the first floor are paired in openings with large semicircular arches. Second floor and tower windows are simple rectangles with stone sills and lintels. The third floor, which is located behind the hip roof, has rectangular dormer windows plus small windows in the octagonal tower and in a gable over the main entrance. The main entrance is located behind an enormous stone arched opening and is reached by a monumental stairway. The building is in excellent condition and is a fine example of the Romanesque style executed in stone. Aluminum doors and frames have been installed at the front entrance; otherwise the exterior is basically original.

Bethel College in North Newton was organized in 1887 when the Mennonite church expanded its seminary at Halstead into an academy. Newton was chosen as the site for the college when the city offered 120 acres of land, valued at \$85,000, and \$15,000 in cash for erection of the administration building. In April, 1887, the general conference of the Mennonite church consented to a private organization building and maintaining a college in accordance with the Newton offer. The private corporation, The Bethel College of the Mennonite Church of North America, was granted a charter by the Kansas secretary of state on May 23, 1887.

Immediately after the charter was granted, the building committee opened correspondence with several architects and visited five other Kansas colleges to gather information concerning the best plans for a modern college building. On October 20, 1887, the board approved the plans submitted by Willis T. Proudfoot of Wichita.

Construction of the foundation began in December, 1887, and the cornerstone was laid October 12, 1888. Shortly thereafter financial difficulties brought a cessation of construction for 21 months. Building operations were resumed in 1890 and by December, 1890, the walls were completed to the window sills of the second story. Contracts for the carpentry and the tin work in the building were let January, 1892, and the masonry work was completed in May, 1892. Although the administration building was not quite completed by the fall of 1893, dedicatory services were held as planned and classes began on September 20, 1893, with an enrollment of 60 students. The building was completed soon afterward at a total cost of \$37,000. The school continued as an academy and Bible school until 1912 when the first Bachelor of Arts degrees were granted.

The Bethel College Administration Building is the oldest! Mennonite institution of higher learning in the United States. In addition to its historic significance, the Administration Building is an attractive, well-preserved and well executed example building Romanesque style in Kansas stone.
