Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Colorado State Hospital Superintendent's Residence is a two-story house built in the Mediterranean style. The prominent features associated with this design and incorporated into the building include a red tile roof, white stucco wall finish, wrought iron window grates and parapet railings, cast concrete twisted colonettes flanking the arched entryway and fluted pilasters framing the window openings. The only feature which does not appear consistent with the primary style is the art deco cast concrete cap over the arched entrance.

The house is laid out in a square plan with the rear (northeast) portion elevated to a second story. The residence is constructed of building tile covered with stucco. The second story hipped roof and the awning over the front windows are covered with red roof tiles. The remainder of the roof is flat and surrounded by a parapet. Originally, two open porches flanked the main entrway, now enclosed with glass brick and aluminum-framed picture windows.

The majority of the other windows in the building are wood, double hung. A majority of the first floor windows are double hung, three-over-two; and the second story windows are one-over-one. There is a row of arched windows with radiating mullions on the southeast side of the first floor which encloses what was originally an open porch at the rear entrance. Some small lead glass windows are found in the area of the staircase on the southwest side of the building. All the windows were originally covered with grates, which over time, have been removed. The only two remaining have been converted into iron gates which are located at the southwest corner of the house. The present window grates are of a more modern design.

The interior of the building remains essentially unaltered except for the enclosing of the porches and some modernization, such as in the kitchen (date of alterations unknown). The most architecturally significant areas are the living room with its cast plaster ceiling and cast concrete fireplace, and the study with its parquet floor. All the walnut wood molding in the house was from lumber salvaged from the "Gray Building"—the original State Hospital Building—when it was demolished.

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A stone fireplace in the basement and outside wall was fashioned by Pueblo bricklayer, Walter Carlson. The plasterwork was done by Benjamin Underhill.

Outbuildings on the nominated property include a garage with an attached playhouse located to the rear of the house. It dates to the early 1930s, has a white stucco finish matching that of the main house and curvilinear gables. A stuccoed wall with coping encloses a garden on the west side of the house and is original to the house. Within the garden space and behind the house are the following elements: stone wall with arched entrance, and a stone firepit. All the stone structures date to the 1930s. The contributing elements, therefore, include 1 building (garage/playhouse); 3 structures (stone wall, stucco wall, stone firepit).

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Superintendent's Residence of the Colorado State Hospital in Pueblo is the most important surviving historic building on the campus of this significant institution. The hospital has had a major impact on the community of Pueblo and the state of Colorado as the only institution for treatment of the mentally ill from 1879 until 1961 (when Fort Logan Mental Health Center was built). The house has additional historical interest as the home of Dr. Frank Zimmerman, who was instrumental in gaining nation-wide recognition for the Colorado State Hospital as a leader in the care and treatment of the mentally ill. It is architecturally noteworthy in illustrating the Mediterranean style. The long, horizontal lines of the design, use of red clay tile, low-pitch roof, stucco wall finish, and the detailing around the entranceway combine to identify the house as an excellent example of its style.

For twenty-seven years, from 1934 to 1961, Dr. Zimmerman lived in the house on hospital grounds. As superintendent (1928 to 1961), he continually fought for better facilities for the mentally ill and for upgraded salaries of the staff who treated them. He was an acknowledged humanitarian who was ever aware of the stigma of shame attached to mental illness and tried to correct this image by insisting on proper housing and treatment. Most of the hospital's progress occurred during his administration, and he managed to expand and enhance the services of the institution even as its population increased dramatically.

Only one other superintendent occupied this house for any length of time--Dr. Charles E. Meredith, who was employed in December of 1963 and resigned in December of 1976. The house has not been occupied since 1981 when a transition program for the elderly (stated in 1978) was transferred to the mental health centers. Refurbishing was begun in August 1984, and the residence now serves as a conference center and overnight facility for CSH and other mental health-related staff. It is presently being developed into a museum which will trace the history of the Colorado State Hospital.




