

STATEMENT

On a street of small commercial enterprises ranging from the Mid-19th century to the present, the Union Electric Telephone Building catches the eye with its delightfully incongruous classicism. The pediment on giant, fluted corinthian pilasters seems to have been put on almost after the fact. Presumably, the facade was meant to project, through stylisms popularly associated with government buildings, an air of public service that would reassure and encourage local inhabitants to subscribe to Union's telephone system.

AIFICANCE

this building illustrates several aspects of turn of the century telephone service the competitive nature of local telephone franchises and the limited but growing scale of local service. In addition, the building's juxtaposition with the modern day Bell telephone building is a telling historical footnote.

DESCRIPTION

Telephone service first appeared in Davenport in 1878 and expanded substantially by 1900 with more than 1600 customers being served by the only franchise company; Iowa Telephone Company.

Before WW I, two other companies provided competition, including Union Electric Telephone and Telegraph Company. Established in 1903, with a 25 year franchise, Union had approximately 1400 customers. Its 6th and Harrison building served until the company closed in 1911. Another company, Tri-City Automatic Telephone Company opened in 1912 but closed a few years later. More than 50 private phone companies operated in Scott County in 1910. Thus, by 1916 the only surviving company was the Iowa Telephone Company, the parent of the modern day Bell system.
