Inventory of Historic Places in South Carolina, 1980 Description

Constructed in 1927, Wardlaw Junior High School was designed by architect J.B. Urquhart. This three-story brick structure with Gothic detailing was built in a rectangular plan with a central courtyard. The facade, south elevation, is broken into five bays with the end bays and central bay projecting. The end bays are windowless, yet exhibit flanking buttresses and decorative brickwork. The projecting central bay serves as the elevated entrance which is approached by a wide granite staircase. The entrance is accented by a pointed arch and Gothic window tracery above the doors. The flanking buttresses are infilled with an engraved panel bearing the name of the school, nine-over-nine double hung windows, and a blind arcade with diapering brickwork at the terminus. The remainder of the facade is highlighted by a cast stone belt course and a series of decorative stone panels beneath the three unit (cont.)

Sign.ficance

Wardlaw Junior High School is located on Elmwood Avenue at the edge of a commercial and old residential area in Columbia, South Carolina. Begun in December of 1926 and completed in September of 1927, Wardlaw's significance lies in the fact that it was the first junior high school building in the state. I

In addition, its design by J_*B_* Urquhart is a good example of a 1920's collegiate Gothic building. 2

The grounds, formerly a farm which was a part of a plantation, are accented by large magnolias. Twenty-eight of the original 37 magnolias remain. The farm was bought (cont.)

Verbal Boundary Description The boundary of the Wardlaw Junior High School nomination is shown as the red line on the accompanying Richland County Tax Map #09012 drawn to a scale of 100 feet to the inch. The boundaries enclose the block upon which the school is located and include the school building, playground, parking lot and surrounding yard and trees.

Description (cont.)

groupings of windows on the third floor. The stone cornice on the facade changes to a corbelled brick cornice on the rear, north elevation.

Projecting one-story porches serve as ground floor entrances around the building.

The west elevation includes another projecting bay which serves as the entrance to the school's two-story auditorium.

The rear, north elevation, breaks with the typical window patterns with the use of a single row of second story windows in the school's gymnasium. A subsequent two-story addition was constructed, on the north and east elevations in a manner that is sympathetic to the original structure.

The school's interior features hardwood floors in the classrooms, a glazed brick wainscot in the hallway, and an ornamental pressed tin ceiling in the auditorium.

The school is surrounded by a mixture of commercial and residential uses on the east and west, a church on the north and commercial use across the street to the south. The school's front yard is filled with large magnolias that isolate the school and serve as a buffer from its commercial neighbors.

Significance (cont.)

in 1874 by Mr. Melton, brother-in-law of Mr. Washington Clark. When the land was purchased for the site of the state's first junior high, the property was referred to as the "Old Washington Clark Place." 3

Built when Dr. William Harvey Hand was superintendent of schools, the construction cost was \$220,000. 4

Before Wardlaw was built, schools in South Carolina were organized into elementary schools, grades 1-7, and high schools grades 8-11. The administration of the Columbia City Schools felt that a junior high school, housing seventh and eighth grade children and equipped with sewing rooms, acience laboratories, machinery shops, music and art rooms, a gymnasium and a library, would offer children in Columbia a better educational advantage. There was strong opposition to the school on the part of a group of influential citizens, so starting the school as soon as possible became a priority. Wardlaw Junior High set out to prove that a longer school day and more than traditional subject matter would be an educational advantage. 5


Wardlaw opened with about 700 pupils in the 7th and 8th grades and a staff of 30 teachers. 6

The school was named for Dr. Patterson Wardlaw, "one of the foremost educators of the South", at the time, a member of the faculty of the University of South Carolina. 7


