Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The two-story red brick building faces northerly from its position on a large lot on the southwest corner of Main Street with Arlington Avenue. There is a one-story wing to the westerly side. One-story porches across the front of the house and wing have turned wood columns with jigsaw brackets, railings with turned wood balusters, spindle friezes, and broken wheel-like decorations between the doubled columns of the main porch. The entrance onto this main porch is emphasized by a slightly projecting pedimented bay with a circular opening having a radiating, stick surround, suggesting a traditional Chinese form.

Above the entrance porch there is a small balcony with a single central turned column and large quarter-circle brackets supporting a shingled gable. Adjacent to this unusual element is a large shingled gable containing a slightly projecting bay with two tall floor to ceiling windows on the first floor opening to the gallery and a single tall window on the second floor with a keyhole-shaped stone This window, suggesting a Moorish influence, has caused the house enframement. to become known as the "Keyhole House". The westerly side of the house is marked by another shingled gable, at the apex of which rises a large chimney. The one-story wing on this side of the house also has a shingled gable with a chimney at its peak. On the easterly, or Arlington Avenue, side of the house, there is a porte cochere with a small stair leading to a side entrance door, which is actually a floor to ceiling window. Above, there is a small roofed balcony. Both porte cochere and balcony have turned columns and spindle work like that of the front porches. The front entrance, with an ornate wood enframement, has a pair of double doors with small square lights in the upper part and wood panels below.

The entrance doors open into a hall with a fireplace to the right and wide double sliding doors opening into a large, nearly square room to the left. The hall fireplace has an elaborate wood mantel with a facing of decorative tile containing figures representing morning, noon and night. The room to the left, and the room behind it, have corner fireplaces, back to back, each with elaborate carved wood mantels with tile facings and mirrors above. The ceilings are coved and the front room has a square plaster ceiling centerpiece. The two rooms on the left have a pair of large sliding doors between them.

In the rear part of the entrance hall, separated from the front by a pair of turned wood posts supporting a cross beam, there is an elaborate staircase with a jigsaw railing. To the right rear of the entrance hall, a doorway leads into a large room forming the right wing of the house. This room also has a fireplace with a wood mantel, wood over-mantel with mirror, and tile facing. coved ceiling has a circular plaster centerpiece. Large windows on three sides of this room admit an abundance of light. A floor to ceiling window provides entrance to this room from the porch across the front of this one-story wing.

The house possesses a high degree of architectural integrity. Exterior alteration has been limited to the addition of a small frame-with-brick-veneer room attached to the back porch and the enclosure of the back porch on both levels. Interior alterations have been limited to remodeling of the kitchen and two baths.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The "Keyhole House" is a regionally rare example of domestic architecture exhibiting an Oriental, or Moorish, influence as well as a shingle-style influence. The mass and form, the consistent character and fine workmanship of its details, both inside and out, make this unusual house one of the most architecturally significant of the late nineteenth century houses of Natchez. This house is classified as an "important" landmark building in the Natchez-Adams County Landmarks Inventory by Arch Winter and Sam Wilson. The house was constructed prior to September, 1901, the date of a Sanborn Insurance Map depicting the house on its lot.
