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Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Hicks Place is a one-and-a-half story Greek Revival house, five bays wide by three bays deep, constructed on a six-room center-hall plan. A rear ell, added in 1911 for a kitchen, is at the southwest corner. An undercut gallery extends across the entire front elevation. Six Doric columns support a pedimented front gable with denticulated cornice. Guttae enrich the corners of the pediment. Piercing the pediment are two symmetrically spaced double-hung windows with six-over-six glazing. The facade is divided by pilasters. A central recessed entrance is composed of a single door flanked by engaged Doric columns, sidelights, and transom.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Hicks Place, located on Mississippi Highway 309 near Byhalia, is a one-and-a-half story, wood-frame Greek Revival house. Built by Martin Pickett Myers on land he acquired in 1850, its construction is documented by a letter, dated May 13, 1855, from Myers to his mother: "We are building a new house, commenced it last November, expect to get in it in about three weeks. The plastering and all the brick work is not done and will not be finished before next fall or winter." During Myers' five-year occupancy of the house a notable feature was a large second-floor room reached by outside steps at the rear of the house intended for public religious services. The room was furnished simply. An early resident, Annice E. Hicks, for whom the place was named, recalled: "When I was growing up, I remember seeing benches made of logs with planks placed across them, in the 'preaching' room." This same source recalls that her father, a subsequent owner, had the steps removed and replaced the doorway with a window.

Except for the addition of a kitchen in 1911, and later a bathroom, the Hicks Place has remained largely unaltered. Parts of the house have never been wired for electricity. The present owners, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Hunt III, acquired the Hicks Place in 1968 and have maintained it in its near-original condition.

The house is significant as one of the best preserved examples of vernacular Greek Revival architecture in north Mississippi.
