Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Old Frankfort City Jail is located on Railway Avenue in Frankfort, Kansas. It faces south toward the railroad tracks which run parallel to the street for several blocks. The building is situated on a sparsely developed block, the main feature of which is the depot that sites kitty-corner across the street and on the other side of the tracks. The jail is a simple single-cell stone structure, measuring 20 feet by 16 feet.

The Frankfort city jail is built of the native limestone found in abundance in the Vermillion valley area. The stone blocks are carefully laid up in courses. The gable end of the single-story structure faces the street. Situated atop the roof peak at the south end of the building is the chimney. The stove to which it was connected is no longer in the jail.

The only door is located on the south wall. The east and west walls each have two windows located directly beneath the cornice. Sills and lintels of the windows and door are made of single slabs of stone. The wooden box cornice is badly rotted but provides the only bit of what could be called architectural detailing with its cornice return.

The interior consists of one room that originally held a stove and presumably a cot. It has bare stone walls and stone floors, and a corrugated tin ceiling.

The structure is currently used by the City of Frankfort as a storage facility. A stone block was removed from the south wall in order to thread a hose to the outside from the inside. Aside from that, the jail appears very much as it did when it was first constructed.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Frankfort city jail is typical of city jails built throughout Kansas. Characteristic of this building type is the rectangular plan, single story height, medium pitched gable roof, small barred windows, and the barred door. The Kansas Historic Sites Inventory reveals that stone was a popular building material for the jails, but concrete block and wood also were used. The Frankfort jail was recycled by the city in the early 1950's for use as a storage shed when it could no longer be used as a jail. Its significance derives from its high level of architectural and contextual integrity.

Frankfort grew steadily from its founding in 1867 through the first couple of decades of the twentieth century. Law enforcement came to Frankfort full time in 1875 with the election of the first marshal. By 1893 a calaboose stood one block east of the business district. This frontier jail was shown on a Sanborn insurance map of that year.

In February of 1896 the city purchased the lot just west of the calaboose, on which the new jail was built. By June of that year the jail was complete. This is known from a June 16 account in the Frankfort Bee which reported that "a drunken fracas of some kind occurred at the joint near the city jail last Saturday . . . "

The Frankfort city jail continued to function as such until it was closed for unspecified reasons in the early 1950's. Unlike many other city jails, the Frankfort jail has not been moved. It still occupies its original site across from the railroad tracks and behind the main business district. Alterations have been restricted to the addition of a hose to the front facade and this has not detracted from its jail-like appearance. Many city jails have disappeared entirely and many more are in serious states of disrepair. The Frankfort jail is a fine example of a vanishing species.
