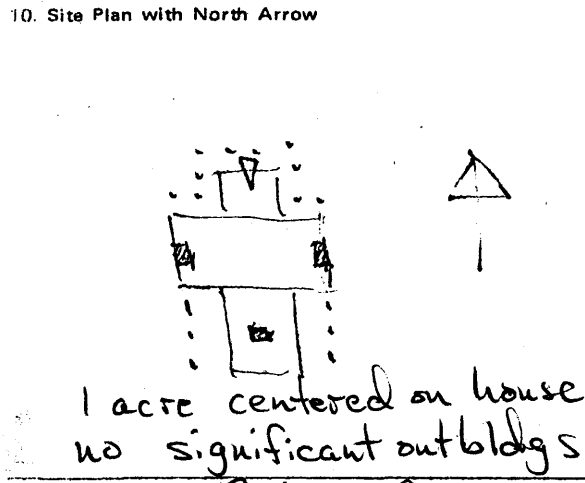

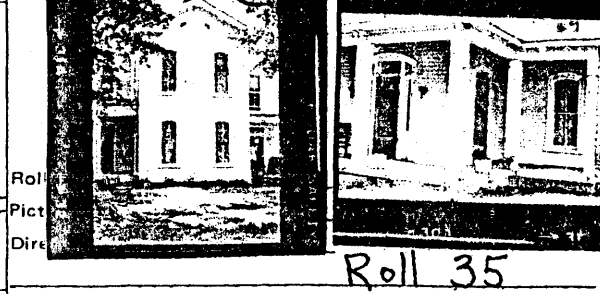

History * long before the Civil War Edward Seeley came to Warren County from Lexington - during the conflict this home was used to shelter wounded soldiers - Captain Seeley was a well-known businessman in Bowling Green and at one time Secretary - Treasurer of the Green and Barren River Navigation Company. It was sold to the Government in 1867. He had been part owner

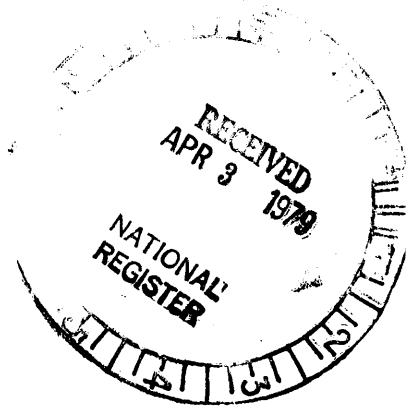
