Beginning at the point where the north bank of Allen Fork intersects with the east side of Rogers Lane (C), proceed along Allen Fork 650' northeastward (D). Then proceed 600' southeast across the ridge (A) turning southwest for 700' to Rogers Lane (B). Then proceed northwest along the east side of Rogers Lane to the point of origin. The boundary polygon includes the farmhouse, all outbuildings and sufficient acreage to provide a setting.

# 45. Description and House Plan:

In form, plan and detial, the  $\underline{\text{Delph house}}$  is essentially intact. The one-story brick house consists of a hall-parlor main block (facing northwest) and an original one-room ell to the rear. An addition built in 1954 fills the angle of the ell and extends beyond the east end of the house. The three bays of the facade are not quite symmetrically placed. Changes include adding 2/2 windows in the gable-ends and a door to the end of the ell, replacing the front door and its surround, and covering the window opposite the front door.

The six-over-six windows are original, as are the slender Federal moldings in the gable-ends, but the original cornices, if any, have been removed. The sill are of wood, the jack arches over the openings are of gauged bricks, and the brickwork of the walls is laid in common bond. The transom over the front door is concealed behind a wood covering, and the door and its surround were replaced sometime in the late 19th century.

The interior Federal woodwork includes chairrails, five-panel doors, opening surrounds that match the exterior gable-end moldings, simple pilastered mantels (3), and, beside the chimney in the ell, a two-tiered cupboard of beaded boards.

The single remaining 19th century outbuilding, a <u>barn</u> for cows and horses, appears to have been built in the late 19th century, within the period of significance of the property. A rectangular, wood frame structure sheathed with vertical boards, the barn has a gabled roof covered with asphalt shingles, a single entry bay in the northeast side, and three square windows in the opposite side. The barn vent is a squar, louvered structure at the center of the ridge. The shed-roofed, vertical-board addition at the northwest end of the barn was apparently built soon after the main section. It contributes to the property by

illustrating the agricultural economy of the original occupants of the house and its role as a farmhouse. During the 20th century, the land near the house was extensively planted with fruit trees, pear, peach, apple and plum. Three small, noncontributing outbuildings east of the house, of frame construction, with gable or shed roofs, appear to have been constructed in the early to middle 20th century.

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
