## DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Thompson house is a Georgian Revival residence located on a lot adjacent to the community's central business district. The house is rectangular in form, with symmetrical front elevation and a tiled hipped roof with deck. On the east side is a first-story rectangular bay, surmounted by a much smaller polygonal bay. The kitchen-pantry area fills in the angle formed by the first story bay and main block.

Roof dormers (two each side) are pedimented, with small corner pilasters. The building is of frame construction, faced with narrow clapboards, and has fluted corner pilasters. Windows on the sides and rear are of varying sizes, all set in plain surrounds. The front windows are arranged in a three-stage composition, a broad spandrel panel forming the center stage. These windows have entablatures and are framed by short pilasters, as are the spandrel panels. The most prominent feature is the pedimented portico, supported on pairs of fluted Corinthian columns. The main entrance is set within an aedicular frame, with sidelights and six-light transom panel. Small oval windows are set between the paired pilasters which flank the entrance, and there is a fanlight in the tympanum of the portico.

Principal alterations are the loss of the roof deck balustrade and the balcony, with its massive brackets, over the main entrance. A good deal of the original fine detail has been lost: acanthus modillions, decorative spandrel panels between the front windows, Corinthian capitals of the corner and front window pilasters. There is a long, one-story addition on the west side of the building, erected in 1950.

The plan of the house consists of rooms arranged around a central broad, T-shaped main hall. Flooring is for the most part oak, with ceramic tile in the main entry way. Much of the original woodwork (including some built-in shelving in the dining room) remains, along with leaded glass in many windows and interior doors, and a finely-executed denticular cornice, with acanthus modillions and egg-and-dart molding, in the parlor.

The house was recently acquired by the local historical society and is undergoing careful restoration.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Thompson house, completed in 1900, is a fine expression of Georgian/Colonial Revival architecture, exhibiting most of the prominent characteristics of the style: rectangular plan, hipped roof with deck, symmetrical facade, and, as the central feature, the giant portice with its fluted Corinthian columns and pilasters. The loss of fine detail (modillions, spandrel panels, corner pilaster capitals) and of the front balcony and front and roof deck balustrades is unfortunate, but does not seriously compromise the overall fine character of the house. Interior features, including several fireplaces, the parlor ceiling, and elements of the woodwork are also of note.

The house was designed by the Chicago firm of Beauley and Peabody, and erected under Beauley's personal supervision. Of Peabody, almost nothing is known. William Jean Beauley (1875-1941) was born in Joliet, Illinois, and came to Chicago in 1893 and worked at the World's Fair of that year (whether as a builder or architect is not clear). In 1894 he went to Paris to study architecture, and upon his return to Chicago in 1896 formed a partnership under the name of Peabody and Beauley, Architects. In 1900, Beauley left the partnership, to become Art Director for Hart Schaffner & Marx. He was also an artist of some note, This work exhibited in many of the country's art museums and...in permanent exhibitions of New York galleries." (Obituary, Illinois Society of Architects, April 1, 1941)

Charles J. Thompson, for whom the house was built, was a locally prominent banker in Forest City.
