Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

St. Francis Xavier Cathedral is located on Fourth Street on the periphery of downtown Alexandria. The Latin cross church has a 5 bay nave, a tall transept, and a semioctagonal apse. It has heavily proportioned gables and simple lancet arches with "Y" tracery. Some features, including the transept, rose windows, the 3 part entrance, and the 135 foot tower with its 4 centered arches, were taken from a later period of Gothic architecture. The tower is surmounted by crenelation and 4 small corner towers which resemble Elizabethan chimneys. Clearly the design was not drawn with a view toward archaeological correctness.

The following changes have been made since 1907 when the tower was completed:

- (1) The 3 part gabled entrance archway has been stuccoed over.
- (2) The interior has been completely replastered and the false vaulting has been painted.
- (3) The impressive stained glass windows have been releaded and protected with plate glass.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Criterion C

St. Francis Xavier Cathedral is significant in the area of architecture as the finest and most monumental Gothic style church building in the city of Alexandria. It is also a local landmark, having been for a time the city's tallest structure.

Although the present church dates from 1895, the congregation traces its roots to the early nineteenth century, In 1817 a Catholic church or chapel was established in Alexandria which is considered to be the forerunner of St. Francis Xavier. In fact, it was the first church structure of any denomination in Alexandria. Its location is not known.

By 1832 the small chapel was in need of repair and had outgrown its usefulness so steps were taken to erect a new church. Four acres of land were acquired on lower Front Street, between present-day Xavier and Bellier Streets, and the new church was built in 1834. It was named St. Francis Xavier and was for several years the sole church structure in Alexandria.

By 1895 the need for a larger church to replace the old one was evident, and this is when the present church was built. It was located in the upper part of the city and not in lower Alexandria where the old church was situated. While the new St. Francis Xavier Church was under construction the original church was destroyed by fire.

Because of the central location of Alexandria and the size of the new church there, Cornelius de Ven, Bishop of the Diocese of Natchitoches, petitioned Rome that the See City for the diocese be transferred from Natchitoches to Alexandria and that its church be elevated to a cathedral. In 1910 Pope Pius XI revoked the title of cathedral from Immaculate Conception in Natchitoches and elevated the St. Francis Xavier Church in Alexandria to the dignity of a cathedral.
