He worked in Christian throughout 1840 and 1850s, then moved to Illinois after the Civil War. (see Ch-129). Carter Bradshaw was a partner in the firm of H. G. Abernathy and Sons. (see Ch-H-107)		35. Organization KHC	
20. Significance This house was built in 1850 by William S. Pratt for Carter L. Bradshaw. Pratt also worked on the Olivet Church (see Ch-129) before moving to Illinois in the late 1860s.
