The church building, now known as the Selma Methodist Church, was built about 1874. The front doorway, which is the only entrance to the building, is located in the center of the south facade and has double doors, originally taller than at present, with a Gothic style pointed transom. Two windows, one on each side, flank the entrance and have Gothic style pointed heads over double hung sash. The east and west sides of the building have five windows each that match those flanking the entrance. octagon bay window in the center of the north side serves as the apse and contains two windows identical to the others except shorter in height. brick flue is located east of the apse just inside the north wall. The roof has approximately a sixteentwelve pitch and is presently covered with composition On the south end of the roof is a well proshingles. portioned cupola having a square base rising out of the roof, topped by an octagonal bell-tower, minus the steeple, but covered with a low hip roof. Centered in the south gable, above the entrance, is a circular medallion containing four wooden trefoil ornaments arranged to form a simple cross. The exterior is covered with simple wood clapboard having a plain frieze board, simple corner boards faintly resembling pilasters and a simple unmoulded box cornice. structure rests on a low open brick pier foundation. The concrete front steps have three treads and three risers.

The interior contained originally a single flat ceilinged sanctuary. However, the south end has been partitioned off into two rooms on either side of a vestibule, above which is a balcony reached by a small staircase from the southeast room. A brass bell, housed in the cupola, is rung by a rope which drops to the balcony. A wall ladder provides access to the cupola.

Wood floors with plaster walls and ceiling are simple and plain. A modern plywood wainscot has been added and the original pews have been remodeled somewhat. Built into the front of the chancel is a semicircular prayer bench which projects from the rear of building in front of the

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Selma was a prosperous hamlet prior to the Civil War. It was located on an Indian Trace which originally crossed the Mississippi River at Gaines Landing and headed north to Pine Bluff and beyond. Soon after the state's secession from the Union, at Lynchburg, Virginia, a group of men from Selma was mustered into the Confederate Army as Company D of the Third Arkansas Infantry Regiment, the only Arkansas detachment to serve in Lee's Army of Northern Virginia.

The town was incorporated in 1876, but the railroad soon bypassed the place, and it decreased in importance.

In the winter of 1873 the small Methodist congregation at Selma suffered a severe setback. The church which they had labored to build was destroyed by a heavy snowstorm. It wasn't until twelve years later that the group was to have its own church.

The Methodist congregation at Selma was first organized in 1870. It could not support a pastor of its own, so it was on one of the many circuits operated by the Methodist Church in Arkansas. In September of 1872 Mr. Joshua Tillar and his wife deeded to the trustees of the congregation a lot on which to build a church. It was this structure which was destroyed in the winter of 1873.

In the next twelve years the Methodist congregation worshiped with the Baptists and

assumed part of the indebtedness of the church building. In 1885 the Baptists deeded their church to the Methodists. That building is the structure presently nominated.

The Baptist congregation had organized in 1870, with eleven members and J. F. Griffin as pastor. The little church prospered until the railroad bypassed the town. The churchhouse was built in 1874 by a Mr. Rector, and the architect is alleged to have been an itinerant from New Orleans who specialized in designing churches. The Old Military Road runs diagonally across the church grounds.

The church building is an outstanding example of the small, rural houses of worship which dotted the countryside in Arkansas during the last century. Its state of preservation is unusually excellent, for most such buildings have deteriorated badly. Thus, it is especially worthy of notice.

In 1968 a preliminary survey of certain historic buildings in Arkansas was undertaken at the request of Governor Winthrop Rockefeller. This survey resulted in the "Kendrew Report" which recommended that the Selma Methodist Church be preserved because it "represents a fine effort on the part of the early residents of this area to provide a place of worship of creditable design."

The Selma Methodist Church has been in continuous use as a church building since 1874. Today it continues to serve the needs of the citizens of Selma as a place of worship.

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

Dear Mr. Peacock:

Thank you for your letter of January 27, 1981, expressing your thoughts on the inclusion of religious properties in the National Register of Historic Places. We apologize for not responding sooner.

The criteria for evaluating potential entries for the National Register state that ordinarily properties owned by religious institutions or used for religious purposes are not considered elibible for the National Register. However, a religious property which derives primary significance from architectural or artistic distinction or historical importance does qualify for listing in the National Register. The impact on society of religion and religious institutions is recognized by the National Register criteria and provides a basis for the listing of many religious properties. There are a number of religious institutions in Arkansas which are listed in the National Register, including

> Trinity Lutheran Church, Conway County. Mount Olive United Methodist Church, Crawford County. Selma Methodist Church, Drew County. Our Lady of Perpetual Help Church, Franklin County. Old Bethel Methodist Church, Green County.

Enclosed are copies of the "Federal Register", which list all properties entered in the National Register prior to December 1980 and information on the National Register program.
