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Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Western Bohemian Fraternal Union Hall is located two and half miles south of Meadowlands, Minnesota, a small town of about 250 people in south central St. Louis County. The building is surrounded by rural farms and homes.

The Western Bohemian Fraternal Hall, now known as the Western Fraternal Life Association Meadowlands #361 Hall (or simply the Meadowlands Hall), was constructed in 1925 by the original lodge members (Kopie,Krutina,Vodochodsky,Holets,Kucera,Leuzensky, Marek, Karasek, Dittrich, Svamek, Stecher, Simon, Kozumplik, Valla, Fleisleber, Slavek, and Kadera). These Czech immigrants cut logs on their farms. The lumber was hauled by horses to a local sawmill, owned by a man named Turnboom, to be cut and planed. A wooden platform was built in 1924 for a July 4th celebration and throughout the next year more lumber was cut. The structure itself was built after the 1925 4th of July celebration and on December 20th the first meeting was held at the hall. In June 1928 an additional 30' was added to the rear of the hall for about \$1,000.00.

The hall is a one story rectangular building measuring approximately 40' by 80', three bays wide and six bays long. The building is faced with clapboard siding and has a concrete foundation. The hipped roof was shingled in 1979. Rafter ends are visible under the eaves. A front vestibule with double doors, added soon after the hall was completed, opens into another set of double doors that lead into the hall. The entrance steps are concrete. The 6/6 sash windows are original.

The interior of the hall consist of a large room with a center state, two small dressing rooms, a balcony and a bar room and kitchen under the balcony. A large wooden floor, once used by gymnists, is original. The hall is equipped with electricity but has no running water.

During the 1930's, an unemployed Czech artist named Fryzek was commissioned to paint the interior. He embellished the hall with oil paintings depicting castles and landmarks of Czechoslovakia alledgely using postcards from the country as sources for the scenes. Painted on canvas and tacked to the ceiling, these paintings still exist although some water damage did occur prior to the installation of the new roof. A stage and three sets of scenery were also painted by Mr. Fryek. Little else is known of the artist except that he may have been from Nebraska.

Structurally, the Western Bohemian Fraternal Union Hall is in good condition. Besides the addition of a new roof, the removal of exterior wood vertical supports is the only alteration. Originally located between the bays on the front facade and between the first three bays on each side, these supports were removed when the wood began to deteriorate. Vertical wooden panels between these bays remain as evidence of these supports

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Western Bohemian Fraternal Union Hall is historically significant as one of the few known rural Czech halls still actively used by a Western Bohemian Fraternal Union Lodge in the state of Minnesota. The hall served as Czech center for fraternal lodge and community activities, Czech plays, and Sokol gymnastics. The Meadowlands Hall has local and statewide importance as a visible and still viable representation of the preservation of Czech culture and heritage.

Czechs began arriving in Minnesota in the 1850's and continuted immigrating until World War I. A Czech community, one of the lates in Minnesota, was established in Meadowlands in 1915. A Moravian, employed by the Duluth, Missabe, and Iron Range Railroad,... lured scores of Czechs to Meadowlands in St. Louis County in the years 1915 to 1919. They found bogs and forest instead of prime agricultural land he promised. The Czech settlers remained to farm the land forming a rural community that resisted complete assimilation until World War II.

Czech settlers in Minnesota were quick to form types of organizations that initated development of religious, social, and cultural ways of life. Many Czech immigrants, affected by free thought or religious liberalism in the nineteenth century, expressed themselves through the Czech American press, fraternal lodges, and reading societies and cemetary associations not linked to any specific church. Fraternal lodges were one type of Czech institution that sought to preserve Czech culture and were especially attractive to free thinkers. The Western Bohemian Fraternal Union, begin in 1897 in the western United States, formed a network of lodges in Minnesota and number of these lodges built halls. Known as the Zapadni Ceska Bratrska Jednota or ZCBJ, the Western Bohemian Fraternal Union formed two lodges in Meadowlands-- one in 1918 that was Czech-speaking, Meadowlands Lodge #65 and one in 1935 that held gatherings in English, Meadowlands Jrs. #361. Both lodges used the same hall. They merged in 1975. In 1980, the ZCBJ, by then known as the Western Fraternal Life Association, had twenty-four lodges with 5,152 members in the state. In 1980 Meadowlands and Canby, Minnesota were among few lodges that still had active halls, supporting programs of Czech cultural activities.

Besides lodge activities, the Meadowlands Hall was the home to Sokol gymnastics, another Czech organization. Originating in Bohemia in 1862, it advocated free thought and supported Czech nationalism and unity. The Meadowlands Sokol, formed on July 18, 1926, used gymnastics, drills, and educational events to promote Czech culture. A pummel horse, high bars, parallel bars, and rings were installed in the hall. Paul Stramek was the drill master with assistance from Simon Johanek. Quite acive in the late 1920's and 1930's the Sokol began to decline in Meadowlands after World War II and now no longer exists as an active organization.

The Meadowlands Hall still serves the Western Bohemian Fraternal Union, now known as the Western Fraternal Life Association and is used for various community activities. In 1985 the Lodge (English-speaking) celebrates its 50th anniversary. The Western Fraternal Life Association Meadowlands Lodge #361 remains a visible expression of the preservation of Czech heritage and culture in Minnesota.
