Built between 1852 and 1853 Ironwood was originally the home of Senator Joseph Rogers Underwood. The plans for the house were drawn by Senator and Mrs. Underwood, in consultation with architect Thomas U. Walter. Ironwood, a large, two-story, red brick mansion, was named for the trees on the several hundred acre farm that is bordered on three sides by Barren River.

Most of the materials, including the bricks and lumber used in constructing this substantial home, were secured from the surrounding acreage. The exterior walls are two feet thick while the partition walls are eighteen inches thick. The handsome woodwork throughout the house is of black walnut. Originally a one-story porch, supported by columns that were connected by arched trimmings, extended across the front of the house.

The impressive colossal order portico was added more recently. Six massive Ionic columns on an extended section of the porch support the denticulated cornice and pediment. Behind the columns is a wide, onestory porch running the length of the house. The roof of the porch is supported by smaller Ionic columns. A wide extension of the porch roof on one side of the house is also supported by Ionic columns. The central section of the porch roof is curved partially around the colossal order columns. An attractive balustrade follows the curve of this section of the roof. This central portion of the porch roof also forms a large balcony which can be reached through a double door that is topped by a glass transom and flanked by two tall narrow windows. Beneath this door is the main entrance, which also has a double door; it is flanked by sidelights and topped by a glass transom. Four large windows with shutters complete the front facade.

Ironwood has twelve large rooms. Inside the front entrance are a large hall and a winding staircase. To the left of the hall are a sitting room, music room or den, and bedroom; to the right are a parlor, dining room, kitchen and a large summer porch enclosed by glass. The second floor has six spacious bedrooms that are separated by a central hall. The ceilings of the first floor are thirteen feet in height and on the second floor, fourteen feet. In one corner of the spacious attic is a large cell; reportedly it was constructed as a place of punishment for slaves.

Ironwood, a large, two-story, red brick mansion, was built between 1852 and 1853 by Senator Joseph Rogers Underwood. The front facade of Ironwood is strikingly handsome. Behind a colossal order Ionic portico is a one-story roofed porch that has smaller Dorie columns repeating the theme set by the larger ones of the portico. The plans for the twelve roomshouse were drawn by Senator and Mrs. Underwood in consultation with architect Thomas U. Walter. Between 1851 and 1865 Walter was in charge of the enlargement of the U.S. Capitol, adding the wings and dome to the present structure. He organized the American Institute of Architecture in 1857; became its second president in 1876, and held that office until his death in 1887.

Joseph Rogers Underwood, a second cousin of George Rogers Clark, was born in Goochland County, Virginia, October 24, 1791. He was brought to Barren County, Kentucky in 1803 by his uncle, Edmond Rogers. Underwood graduated from Transylvania College, Lexington, Kentucky in 1811. Serving as a lieutenant in the War of 1812, Underwood was wounded and taken prisoner at the Battle of Dudley's Defeat, May 5, 1813.

Underwood was admitted to the bar in 1813 and moved to Bowling Green in 1823. He served in the Kentucky Legislature, 1816-1819; 1825-1826; 1845-1847 as Speaker of the House; and 1860-1863. Meanwhile, between terms in the Legislature he served as a Judge of the Kentucky Court of Appeals between 1828 and 1835. He was elected to the U.S. House of Representatives, serving from 1835 to 1843 and was elected to the U.S. Senate, serving from 1847 to 1853.

Underwood was very active in the Colonization Society that was organized to send freed slaves to Africa. During the Civil War he was a Unionist, while one of his sons was a Confederate officer. Underwood died in Bowling Green, Kentucky on August 23, 1876, at the age of 84.

Ironwood is surrounded by spacious landscaped grounds. Entrance gates and a winding driveway lead to its front door. Still in use is a log cabin that was located on the grounds when Ironwood was built.

After changing owners several times, Ironwood was purchased around 1920 by the Rodes family. According to Mary Hobson Beard in Old Homes In or Near Bowling Green, Kentucky, during the thirty years of occupancy by Robin Rodes, the old home was remodeled, a handsome Colonial porch added, the interior decorated, the grounds landscaped and the entire farm put in a high state of cultivation. Today, the present owners, Mr. & Mrs. J.H. Webb, have redecorated the interior and furnished it with choice antiques that express the spirit of this stately old home. Now, it is one of the outstanding country places in Southern Kentucky and more beautiful than in former days.
