Like the earlier courthouse and as in many other Georgia town plans, the present Meriwether County Courthouse is situated on a square in the center of town. This almost symmetrical two story brick structure has portico facades or all four sides, two seven bays wide and two five bays wide. Each facade has two story portico, full entablature and pediment with a Georgia State Seal. The fluted, metal columns are of the composite order and stand on a square pedestal. The three central bays of each facade are recessed and correspond to the projection of the portico. Stone quoins define the corners of all projecting parts. White coursing defines each level of the building. All entrances and second level windows are delineated with white arched coursing; all windows have keystones. A large metal dome rests on an octagonal base above the main rectangular part of the building. Crowning the dome is an open, columned cupola that supports a statue of Justice. The building's cornerstone, laid at the time of construction in 1903-4, lists J.W. Golucke and Co. as architects. In 1967 the Records Building was connected to the main building, using materials and features. The architect was Edward W. Neal of Biggers-Scarbord

Neal-Crisp and Clark architectural firm.

The interior features four hallways that connect with a central rotunda The ceilings of these hallways and the courtroom are stamped metal constructi Floors are of hexagonal tiles. There are panelings, mantels, and chair rails in this area. A double stairway leads from the south hall to the second floo and other stairs reach the gallery of the courtroom. Single stairs ascend from the north hall to the Judge's chambers and elaborately paneled platform.

Not only is the Meriwether County Courthouse a fine example of the Neo-colonial mode of the Georgian Revival, but its siting on a centrally located town square is excellent.


Built in 1903-4 and designed by J.W. Golucke, the courthouse exhibits fine proportions and details of classical style. Excellent maintenance has preserved the building. Blue print renderings of the architect's drawings are exhibited in the County Commissioner's Office.

The courthouse is situated in the center of Meriwether County on a site chosen when the town of Greenville was laid out in 1828. It is surrounded by large oaks, shubbery and well-kept lawns. Approaches from all directions, especially east and west present an exceptional view of the courthouse on its elevated, three acre square.

This centrally located planning for a town square is found throughout Georgia after 1803. Courthouses were set off from towns by being surrounded on four sides with lawns and streets to create a square. Bordering the square were stores, offices, residences, hotels, etc. This nucleated plan which seems to have started in Virginia in the 17th century was used in the c.1830 Meriwether County Courthouse and again when the present courthouse was erected
