The initial stage of Sudler's Conclusion now constitutes the east wing of this two part house. Of a one and one half story height, having a single chimney enclosed within the east end wall, the house is of brick, Flemish bond, construction displaying a regular usage of glazed headers throughout. original principle facade at the north elevation is three bays in length with a centrally positioned door flanked by a single window at each side. The former rear (south) facade was two bays in length with a centered door flanked by a single window at its east side. This door was filled in circa 1800 and a window installed flush to the west side of the former opening. At both front and rear roof slopes are two pedimented dormer windows, also installed circa 1800. At the east end elevation of this same block is a door positioned near the southeast Near the northeast corner of this same elevation is a small window which has been bricked in. Both this window and the door, as well as a small attic level window (positioned close to the barge board of the north roof slope), constitute later installations. All original ground floor door and window openings are headed by segmental arches of header brick. the east end elevation, at a line even with the front and rear eave cornices, is an indented two brick belt course with the bricks of both courses set on the diagonal. This same decorative treatment is seen on several other brick houses of this type and apparently was fairly popular with lower Eastern Shore builders of the first half of the eighteenth century.

Although renovated on the interior at an approximate date of circa 1800, Sudler's Conclusion, now undergoing a renovation by its present owners, displays several interesting features. Its plan is of the hall and parlor type with the hall being a rather narrow room extending the length of the north side. has a tall but narrow fireplace opening at the east end, positioned close to the brick partition wall. This room is presently being renovated for use as a modern kitchen. adjoining parlor is somewhat larger and has a more expansive fireplace opening, also the east wall, measuring approximately seven feet in length and six and one half feet in height. each interior side wall is a small bake (warming) oven. original brick hearth (now removed) protruded about four feet into the room flush with the floor level. Flanking the fireplace, on the right (south) side is a door opening into a small Flanking this is a small door which hall which leads outside. opens into a closet. The wall surfaces of this closet display evidence of its having formerly served as an enclosed stair. The top two treads (winders) are still in place and the bottom two treads (now removed), projected out into the room from the stair door.

While all interior wall surfaces are plastered there is (see cont. sheet 1)

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Sudler's Conclusion is situated on a tract of land patented in 1789 by Thomas Leon Sudler. This tract, known as Sudler's Conclusion, was formed from parts of five tracts patented as early as 1665. A 1754 transfer of one of the tracts, Littleworth, mentions a building which may be the same house mentioned in the 1783 Tax Assessment owned by Mary Wheatley and described as "brick dwelling house with two rooms below in middling good repair". This house was probably part of a transfer made to Thomas Sudler in 1789 from Jones Willis. 2

The first definite reference to the house occured in the Federal Tax Assessment of 1798 when Thomas Leon Sudler was the owner of "l dwelling house built of Bricke 28 feet by 24 feet, all one story high." $3\ *$

The house remained in the Sudler family until 1815 when it passed along a chain of local Somerset County owners. During these years, the original 419 3/4 acre tract was reduced to its present 7.91 acres. In 1971 the house was sold to Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Eberly who are in the process of restoration.

Sudler's Conclusion represents one of Maryland's few remaining early eighteenth century dwellings. Its significance lies in its architecture. The diagonally set belt course on the east end is one of three found in Somerset County houses of the period. Other significant elements are the decorative interior details and the laterally partitioned floor plan. The house is so little altered that it is possible to reconstruct the original floor plan.

evidence that the fireplace wall had been originally sheathed with large fielded pine panels. The exposed ceiling joists of both this room and the hall display a very wide bead on their lower edges. The floor boards of this level are apparently original although they have been repaired and patched, especially in the fireplace and stair areas.

The attic level, now reached by ascending the main stair of the later west wing, has suffered several major renovations. initial floor plan consisted of a hall (east end)flanked by two small chambers to one side (west). The two partition walls were of vertical painted boards. The present arrangement is of two chambers, partitioned laterally. The roof collars display the same beaded edge as the ceiling joists of the first floor. In both cases the area above is sheathed with lapped boards. small area above the roof collars is gained by a narrow "stairladder" positioned against the south wall of the chimney stack. This ladder is enclosed within a small closet flanking the former stair. At the west end of the attic is a small gable window which was now been sealed shut. Its original purpose was to serve the former south bed chamber. It is not known whether this window was flanked by one lighting the north chamber since that area has been altered with the introduction of a door opening into the later addition.

The frame two story west wing was probably erected circa 1840. It has a single stair hall at the east end flanked by a single parlor on the west side. This same floor plan is repeated at the second floor level. The addition is two bays in length at both the front (south) and rear (north) elevations with the transomed entrance door positioned toward the east end of both facades. A single chimney is enclosed within the west end wall with its rear (exterior) face exposed at the first floor level. The south wall of this wing is flush to the south wall of the first stage and extends back about three quarters the depth of the west end elevation. Within several years of the erection of this wing a small two story outshut was constructed against the east end of the north wall. It contains an exterior cellar entrance at the first floor level and a small closet chamber above.

Standing in close proximity to the east end of the house are two domestic dependencies, one a log smokehouse and the other a frame tobacco barn. Both date circa 1800 and both are in a ruinous state. At a short distance from the northwest corner of the west wing of the house is a small private cemetery with most of the graves dating from within the first half of the nineteenth century.
