The Brining House is a significant? example of the Queen Anne style in Dayton, characterized by decorative ornament, a projecting front gable pediment, and a variety of surface textures. The house was built by Joseph Wolfstein and sold in 1883 to Brining, a salesman with the Dayton Woolen Mill and later a retailer. Brining was elected to the city

council, served as City Treasurer, and donated land for the

city hopsital.

Additional Descripton of Physical Appearance & Significant Architectural Features: (Architectural significance; can include interior & site features; address integrity issues specifically)

Situated on the banks of Patit Creek on North First on a large corner lot, this tri-gabled ell shaped house has many unique features. The second story of the projecting cutaway bay has a full pediment return with closed eave, pendant in point of gable, dentil and decorative coursing and blue glass chips. There is a plain fascia under this pediment and an open balcony with spindlework frieze, balustrade and horseshoe shaped wooden arch. There are two cutaway bays with spindlework, corner brackets and pendants. The partial front porch has curved wooden brackets forming arches, with pendants in the center and plain square porch supports and small turned balustrades. There are panels of wood slate under the windows in the bay. There is a half round window on main floor and the entry door is the original double glass and paneled door with transom. Most windows are one over one double hung although some are single sash with transom.
