DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Administration Building is situated on a knoll in the geographic center of what was, from 1886-1970, the Owatonna State School for Dependent and Neglected Children. The complex contains the Old School House, the Infant Hospital, the Hospital, the Superintendent's House, three cottages, the Gym, two recently built School Houses, the Power Plant, and the Maintenance Shop. These buildings are architecturally undistinquished but do not interfere with the architectural integrity of the Administration Building.

The Administration Building consists of a three-story central building with connecting North and South wings, each two and one half stories high. It is constructed of brick masonry exterior walls with Kasota limestone embellishments in the form of engaged pilasters, finials, and freestanding columns forming loggias at the flanking wings. The Architecture is derivative of Norman Romanesque, as expressed by round arched elements on the East facade and an engaged circular tower with a flared, conic-shaped slate roof. A carved stone at the entrance steps carries the date 1887 in bold, raised numbers. The exterior walls and the slate roof are in good condition and are unchanged from the original construction.

An extensive one-story addition has been added at the rear at a later date to provide central kitchen and dining facilities for the residents of the State School. It is constructed of brick with a slate roof but is architecturally undistinguished.

TATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Legislature of Minnesota passed an act which was approved by the governor on the 9th of March, 1885, establishing the State Public School for Dependent and Neglected Children, and making provisions for the government of the same. The governor appointed five commissioners for the purpose of selecting a location for the school.

Owatonna was chosen as the site for the location of the school under the advice of Superintendent John N. Foster, of the State Public School of Michigan, and Secretary H. H. Hart, of the State Board of Charities and Corrections of Minnesota. Among the reasons which influenced the commissioners in deciding upon Owatonna as the home for this institution were, first, the fact of its location, very near the center of the oldest and most densely settled portion of the State; second, its easy accessibility by different lines of railroad from any portion of the State.

The institution was formally opened on the 2nd of December, 1886, when three children from Steele County were received. The children admissible to the State Public School were those within the borders of the State who were dependent on the public for support, over three and under fourteen years of age, and in suitable condition of mind and body to receive instruction. The children were placed under the care of the school through proceedings in the probate courts begun by county commissioners.

The Administration Building was erected in 1887, one year after the school officially opened. It was designed by the Minneapolis architect, W. B. Dunnell. Dunnell was also responsible for the design of the Minnesota State Training School Administration Building which is on the National Register of Historic Places. The laying of the corner stone of this building was an auspicious event in Steele County's history. It was performed with ancient and imposing ceremonies, typical for the commemoration of such a building in the 1880s. After the stone was laid, corn, wine, and oil were put on it. A casket in the corner stone contained a Bible, the names of the State, county and city officers, a list of the officers of the Grand Lodge of Minnesota and of the Star of the East Lodge of Owatonna, and copies of the constitution and by-laws of both, the charter of Owatonna, copies of various newspapers, and a copy of the first biennial report of the board of control and superintendent, and a copy of Governor Hubbard's message to the Legislature of 1886-87.

8. Significance

During its 83 year history as the Administration Building for the Owatonna State School this building housed the offices of the Superintendent, matron and teachers, a public parlor, dining rooms for officers and employees, kitchens, pantries, children's dining room, auditorium and chapel. It was the main building until the school was officially closed in 1970.

The Administration Building and various buildings of the Owatonna State School complex are owned by the City of Owatonna. A committee of Owatonna citizens, known as the West Hills Commission, recognizes both the historical and architectural significance of this building and is currently in the process of restoring the building. The long range aim of this commission is to move all city offices to this building once it is restored.

8. Significance -- Administration Building - West Hills

For over 83 years the West Hills Administration Building served as a social institution of the highest merit and represents efforts made by the State of Minnesota to provide education and a homelife for orphans. Architecturally, the administration building is significant as an example of the massive Norman Romanesque style of architecture. The architect, Warren B. Dunnell, conceived of the administration building and dining hall as a complex of architectural grandeur, typical of public buildings in 19th century midwest America. The height and large proportions of the building_ and the massive stone convey this strong impression. The location and construction of the administration building were important events in Owatonna's history. It was built of largely local materials by local craftsmen. The administration building stands as a testimony to Owatonna's unique heritage of skillful craftsmen and creative artisans.
