Built in 1867, the Matheson House is a two-story frame building resting on brick piers? The house is rectangular in plan with an east-west orientation. the front of the house (west side) is a shed-type porch with six free standing square wooden columns carried all the way to the ground. There are four brick chimneys, two of which are on the exterior of the house at the gable ends. The building has, as its most significant feature, a gambrel roof of sufficient pitch to accomodate three standard narrow dormers topped by low pitched gables treated on the front as pediments. The roof is covered with cypress shingles painted green and cut into decorative patterns. Windows are scarce and in all cases are two light sash. The front door is original and has glass sidelights. Additions to the house include a lean-to addition on the east side which houses the kitchen facilities. The interior of the house has heart pine flooring and original fireplaces and mantelpieces. There is a unique balcony at the first stair landing which overlooks the entry hall. The fabric of the house is in good condition.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

James Douglas Matheson, a prominent Gainesville merchant, built this house in 1867. It was inherited by his son, the Rev. Chris Matheson, who was mayor of Gainesville for eight terms in the early 1900's and a member of the Florida legislature in 1917. The house is today occupied by Mrs. Chris Matheson, his widow.

Architecturally, the Matheson house is significant in that the gambrel roof occurs relatively infrequently in Florida. The house reflects characteristics of a transitional style between late Colonial and early Georgian. The gambrel over a single file of rooms (as the Matheson house was prior to additions) can be seen in many North Carolina and Virginia houses after 1725. The similarities, for example, between the Matheson house and the well-known Booth House in Edenton, N.C. are striking. Both have a lean-to addition at the rear and a shed-type porch at the front. Both have the chimney outside and spaced away from the gable. The main variation is in the type of dormer used, Matheson having the pedimented type.

It is possible in the case of the Matheson house that the choice of a gambrel was an economic consideration, in that less material is required and shorter rafter lengths can be used. The cutting of the cypress shingles into ornate patterns would probably not have necessitated great expense due to the fact that Gainesville was, at that time, a milling center. Existing data indicates that the Matheson house, which served as a social center in postbellum Gainesville, is the second oldest house in the city.
