Narrative Description

The Whitewater Post Office is located in the business/commercial district of the city of Whitewater in Walworth County, Wisconsin. The one story, red brick building is an example of the Georgian Revival style influenced by the modernist trends of the 1930s. The 1936 building is L-shaped in plan with the public entrance and lobby on the Center Street façade.

The building sits on an elevated, concrete foundation and has a flat roof. The exterior walls are of red brick laid in American bond with inset terra cotta detailing. The main façade is organized symmetrically about the entry doors. The modern, double doors are contained within an arched surround of painted stone. The arch is somewhat unusual in that the voussoirs come to a slight point at the top of the arch, rather than the rounded arch with keystone expected. In the area between the arch and the doors is a semi-circular fanlight with a decorative iron grille. A slightly raised parapet at the center of the façade emphasizes the entry. A wide flight of stairs of exposed aggregate concrete rises from the sidewalk level to a landing before the doors.

To either side of the front doors are two windows. These are twelve over twelve, double hung windows. The windows are original; however, new storm windows have been added. A square, terra cotta panel is located above each window. A decorative, terra cotta band, defining the base of the parapet, begins over the center of the two inner windows. The band continues on the side elevations.

The side elevations have the same types of windows and decorative treatment as the front façade. An accessible entrance has been added to the first of the six bays of the east elevation. The two central bays of the west elevation contain small, four over four, double hung windows. The projecting rear elevation is the same height as the main block, but contains two stories. A loading dock is at its base.

The interior has had few alterations. It retains its original wood paneling and vestibule. The flooring is the original patterned tile. The walls and ceiling are of plaster.

Overall, the building retains a high level of architectural integrity with minimal alteration to the exterior or the interior public lobby.

Statement of Significance

The Whitewater Post Office is an intact example of a small, Federal post office evaluated in the context of the "United States Post Office Construction from 1913 to 1940, State of Wisconsin – Milwaukee District" Multiple Property Nomination.

This 1936 post office building is an example of a small, urban post office designed in a simplified Georgian Revival style. The original entry door has been replaced, but all other original design elements appear to be intact. The building is nominated under Criterion C for Architecture.

Historic Context

This building is the first federally owned post office building in Whitewater. Prior to its construction, postal services were at various locations. These were selected by a series of local postmasters. Postal service in Whitewater dates from 1840 and D.J. Powers was the first Postmaster.(4)

This post office was one of a series constructed in Wisconsin by the federal Public Works Administration in the 1930s. The history of post office construction under this program is explained in the above-referenced multiple property nomination. As a cost saving measure, post offices built under the relief program were from standard plans. As a result, the Whitewater Post Office and the Kaukauna Post Office (also in Wisconsin) are identical in appearance. The design of this building, as in most cases in the multiple property nomination, is credited to Louis A. Simon and Neal A. Melick of the Office of the Supervising Architect of the Treasury.

Significance

The Whitewater Post Office is locally significant as an example of mid-1930s Georgian Revival design applied to a public building. Elements of this style include symmetry, multi-light windows, and an elaboration of the entrance. The use of red brick with white detailing often identifies institutional buildings of this style. In keeping with the economic constraints placed on publicly funded buildings during the Depression, the Whitewater Post Office contains minimal surface decoration. Rather than a carved cornice, a manufactured terra cotta stringcourse is substituted. Elaboration is confined to the entrance with its masonry arch and the ironwork grille of the fanlight. The interior is similar to many other post offices built during the period. The Whitewater example differs somewhat in its use of a tile floor.

The building retains its identifying architectural features. On the interior, the tile floor, wood wainscot and trim, and the vestibule are original. Overall, the building retains a high level of integrity, presenting an example of the Georgian Revival style applied to a small, federally funded post office project in the 1930s.
