#### DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Y. M. C. A. is a rectangular central core structure which is four stories tall. On the south facade is a hipped-roofed tower which rises two stories above the building. The tower's top floor is an open arcade on four sides. To the west of the tower is a pile whose top floor is a closed arcade. The arcades are decorated with stone arches, impost and piers.

There are two entrances on the south facade. One is a large round arch decorated with flat stone-work. The second has an elaborately decorated stone broken pediment resting on stone pilasters which are topped with urns. Centered on the pediment is a coat of arms held by two putti with garland decorations above their heads. To either side of this entrance are two narrow arched windows separated by columns. The entrance on the east is a round arch framed in a square of stone with shields at each upper corner. Above the door is written in stone "Young Men's Christian Association."

Windows at street level are asymmetrically placed. At the southeast corner are three narrow arched windows separated by columns. At the northeast corner are two sets of two windows separated by single columns. Windows above street level are symmetrically placed.

The building is finished in blonde brick. The foundation is stone and corners have stone quoins. Originally there was a red tile roof.

#### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Little Rock Y. M. C. A. is a large and significant example of Spanish Revival architecture. At the time of its completion in 1928, the sprawling, four-storey, \$200,000.00 Y. M. C. A. was one of the largest and most costly structures in Little Rock. The "Y" was designed by the firm of Mann and Stern, which was perhaps the premier architectural concern in the state at the time. The Y. M. C. A. building was one of the major undertakings of the firm.

The variety of services provided by the Little Rock Y. M. C. A. has included low-cost board, religious education, physical and athletic training, educational programs, and special benefits for servicemen during war. The building represents a significant part of Little Rock's religious and social-humanitarian history.

The Y. M. C. A. was organized in Little Rock in 1885 for the purpose of conducting Bible classes and engaging in civic improvement activities. The first structure that was built for the specific purpose of housing the Y. M. C. A. was erected at the corner of Capitol and Scott Streets in downtown Little Rock in 1905. The demand for use of the facility was almost immediately too great for the new structure to accomodate. Therefore, its period of service as the Y. M. C. A. was short-lived. The 1905 Y. M. C. A. is currently used for offices by the Ark-ansas Democrat, which is a Little Rock newspaper.

When built in 1928, the Little Rock Y. M. C. A. building was acclaimed by the Arkansas Democrat as being "one of the most modern structures of its kind in the South." Much of the money that was used to fund the construction of the building was raised through private contributions. For months the Little Rock newspapers ran articles which related both to the new Little Rock Y. M. C. A. and to other model Y. M. C. A.'s that were located in other cities. Full-page advertisements announced the need for contributions, and the progress of the amount of money which was raised for the construction of the "Y" was reported daily. Editorial cartoons even stressed to readers the benefits which would result from financing the construction of a new Y. M. C. A. building. The intense newspaper coverage of all phases of planning and construction of the new Y. M. C. A. points out the significance with which the activities provided by the "Y" were viewed locally. In fact in 1928 the sentiment in Little Rock seems to have been that for any city to lay claim to being progressive-minded, it must boast a first-class Y. M. C. A.

The Little Rock Y. M. C. A. has, since its completion, experienced changes in the nature of the services it provides. In its early years a major function of the "Y" was to provide low-cost rooms to men, many of whom were transients. Consequently, most of the building was used as a dormitory. During World War II, the Y. M. C. A. and the U. S. O. arranged for military men to stay in the "Y" for 35¢ a night. In recent years the importance of providing rooms to boarders has declined, and now only one floor of the building is used as a dormitory.

Another major service provided by the Y. M. C. A. has been the physical and athletic training of boys and men. Pre-military physical training was administered by the "Y" in World War II. Recently, a number of dormitory rooms have been converted to open areas that contain indoor tracks, exercise rooms, and a cardio-vascular rehabilitation area.

The name of the Little Rock Y. M. C. A. has been changed to that of the Central Branch of the Little Rock Y. M. C. A. because several new Y. M. C. A.'s have been established in various sections of the city. A recent major change in Y. M. C. A. policy has been the admittance of women as regular members. Some of the original dormitory rooms have been removed in order to create space for the women's locker room.

The Y. M. C. A. is currently much more than a large athletic club. Its public service programs reflect the expanded role that the Y. M. C. A. is playing in the community. Among the programs that the "Y" sponsors are parent-child programs, a day care center, religious instruction, a summer food-service program, day camps, and many other instructional and charitable activities.

Although the Y. M. C. A. building is important to the religious and social-humanitarian history of the city, perhaps the greatest significance of the buildings is its Spanish Revival architecture. The four-storey, blond-brick building occupies one-fourth of a city block. The building is rectangular in shape and features a large, open central court. Six-storey towers are located on both the north and south elevations of the building. Major entrances are placed on the structure's east and south elevations. The window and door arrangement is generally symmetrical. The original red ceramic-tile roof has been removed. A red concrete-tile roof is preferred as a replacement, but the ultimate choice of the replacement material will depend upon the availability of funding. The roof form is hipped. With the exception of the roof the exterior of the building is virtually unaltered, but the interior has experienced numerous alterations; however, such important and visible interior areas as the entrance lobby, the tiled indoor swimming pool room, and the basketball court have experienced minimal or no alteration.

The problem in describing the bountiful and often elaborate detail-work found on the exterior of the Y. M. C. A. is that of selectivity, since the viewer is presented with so much detail-work from which to choose. The entrance on the east elevation is double-leaf and is set within a stone arched-recess. The large, smooth-dressed stone entrance-arch-surround is rectangular and is inscribed with the words "Young Men's Christian Association." Stone coats-of-arms are set at the upper corners of the entrance-arch-surround; and raised stone molding, which resembles a dripstone in hood molds, caps the entrance-arch-surround. A second storey, wrought-iron balcony is located above the entrance-arch-surround. The balcony fronts a false entrance that is set within a plain stone architrave.

The stone, double-leaf entrance on the south elevation is more elaborate than the one that is located on the east elevation. The entrance is flanked by pilasters and is topped by a broken pediment. The detail-work on the entrance resembles the platteresque detailing found in Mexican Baroque architecture.

A smooth-dressed stone tunnel pierces the foot of the six-storey tower on the south elevation of the Y. M. C. A. The tunnel leads into the building's open central court. An iron gate bars access to the tunnel.

Several groupings of stone-trimmed arcades are set in the first floor wall of the "Y." The individual arches in the arcades feature foil arches which appear to be derived from Spanish-Moorish architecture.

The section of the first floor that is situated below the line of the water table is battered and is finished in smooth-dressed stone. Smooth-dressed stone quoins are located on each corner of the building.

Most windows on the upper stories of the Y. M. C. A. are rectangular and do not possess elaborate surrounds. Several of the windows are enclosed within wroughtiron window guards. Wrought-iron is also used to form several false balconies on the upper floors and four decorative lamps, set in sconses, on the first storey.

The appearance of the swimming pool wing, which is the west side of the building, differs from that of the rest of the "Y." Few windows are located on the first three floors of the swimming pool wing. Arcades, composed of Roman-arched windows, are located on the south and west elevations of the wing's fourth storey. The arcades form a clerestorey for a basketball court which occupies a portion of the upper three floors of the interior of the wing. The arcade on the south elevation is detailed with stone pilaster imposts and hood molds.

The tower that is positioned on the south side of the building features a full arcade on its sixth storey. A small iron balcony which leads out from a narrow arched aperture is located on the fifth floor of the tower.

Originally, the first floor of the interior of the Y. M. C. A. was a lobby and office space. The three upper floors, excluding those in the swimming pool wing, were dormitory floors. Today, only the fourth floor retains its integrity of use as a dormitory. The second and third floors have been converted into space for locker rooms, indoor tracks, and other open areas.

The first floor lobby retains its original columns, terra cotta trim, and elaborate stairway. The lobby space has been partitioned into several large sections.


The swimming pool wing contains the original locker rooms, indoor pool, and basketball and racquetball courts. The wing has experienced little alteration.
