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## 7. Description

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Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Rankin building is a three story commercial structure located at the N.E. corner of Fourth and Sycamore in downtown Santa Ana. The building is a rectangular sand colored brick structure featuring a grey pressed metal Corinthian cornice, modified Chicago style upper level windows, and a blue grey ceramic brick first story. The structure has embellished cartouches located above the storefronts that display a raised "R" standing for the Rankin business. The upper level building body has brick pilasters with embellished capitals and in each bay midway between the second and third floors are three stylized cartouches. The transom windows are now clear glass, three panels to each store bay and original storefront display windows have been replaced by tripart clear glass panels. The original marble store front bulkheads have been replaced by wood bulkheads on the store bays, but marble has been replaced at each column base. The interior of the building has been recently remodeled (1981) to extend the mezzanine level across the entire building thus adding a new floor to the original 3 story building. The mezzanine floor is not visible from the exterior as fixed blue canvas awnings hide a wood panel covering the anchoring points of the new mezzanine level. The wood storefronts are stained a dark brown and simple wood trim embellishes each storefront.

The structure has changed from it's original configuration on the interior and storefronts. The entire historic interior was altered in a 1950 remodel by local architect Evertt Parks and a 1965 remodel removed the original luxor glass transoms and marble storefront bulkheads. The historic integrity of the exterior has not been altered above the storefronts and the entryways have been maintained in terms of proportion and scale in the 1981 remodel. The original structure had large single pane showcase windows at the storefront level and ornate entry marquees over each street entrance. These marquees were removed the 1950 removation and the showcase windows were altered in size during the 1981

in the 1950 renovation and the showcase windows were altered in size during the 1981 renovation. The building has maintained it's historical integrity through three major renovations and the 1981 renovation restored such elements as entry tile, transom windows and marble bases on the columns.

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Rankin Building is of National Register significance in the local context due to its association with the commercial history of Orange County, its association with a pioneer merchant family and its distinctive architectural prominence in the county's history.

#### **Commercial History**

The Rankin Building was constructed in 1917 by Henry T. Rutherford under lease to pioneer merchant John H. Rankin. The structure was the largest single dry goods establishment in the county and Orange County's first example of a modern department store. The Rankin business was the only retail establishment in the county over two stories and appears to have been the largest single retail building in the county. Investigations in the neighboring cities of Anaheim and Fullerton confirm that while several bank and office buildings were larger, Rankins was the largest single retail establishment of its time and continued to be so until the World War II era. The business was the first county retail department store in that goods once sold in several different types of stores were consolidated under one roof in different departments. Such goods included millinery, china, jewelry and women's clothing. This was the first local example of this type of modern retail innovation.

#### **Pioneer Merchant Family**

John H. Rankin arrived in Santa Ana during the boom of 1888 and set up business as Rankin and Huff's in 1894. (He returned to the east to move his family in the years 1889-93). He continued in business until his death in 1947 and the store retained his name until 1965. John H. Rankin was prominent in Santa Ana civic affairs as a founding and lifelong elder of the First Presbyterian Church (1894-1953). His son Herbert who managed the business from 1909 to 1947 was a community leader and financier. He served as President of the Broadway Development Company, a director of the Bower<sup>s</sup> Museum and actively gave extensive gifts to area churchs, schools, and hospitals. His development company built most of the commercial buildings fronting Broadway (a main thoroughfare) during the 1920's.

#### Architectural Prominence

The Rankin Building today substantially maintains the architectural integrity of the original design. The structure has recently been rehabilitated with the removal of alterations dating from 1952 and 1965 remodelings. The rehabilitation has resulted in storefront alteration. However, the alteration has not resulted in substantial loss of historic fabric and maintains an identifiable relationship with the commercial history of the structure. The entry proportions and transom windows have been retained in an historically valid manner. The upper floor facade has not been altered from the original construction and the ceramic brick of the lower story facade has been cleaned and retained.

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The structure has a distinctly different architectural style than the predominately Beauxarts influenced commerical structures of similar scale. The modified Chicago commercial style upper floor facade sets the building apart from the architecture of the surrounding two story commercial structures. The building was clearly designed for retail exposure and prominence in what was the thriving commercial center of Orange County.
