DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Marcellus Pedrick house is a rectangular, two-story, hip-roofed, Italianate style house constructed of an early form of concrete block with a clapboarded, frame, two-story rear addition flanked on one side by a frame, shed-roofed, one-story addition. The entire house rests on a coursed-rubble limestone foundation. The interior has been greatly altered, and little remains of the original detailing.

The house has walls fifteen inches thick constructed of concrete blocks ten inches long, five inches deep, and five inches high. The blocks are composed of sand and lime and are so soft that they can be scratched easily by a knife. The color of the blocks is similar to the local yellow limestone used in many of Ripon's larger buildings. The walls are sheltered by broad eaves supported by ornate wooden brackets, and the windows have wooden, shaped lintels on small brackets. Attached to the front is a pedimented porch ornamented with spindlework. It is not original, and stylistically it appears to be the most recent addition to the house.

The two-story rear wing has brackets under the eaves and plain moldings around the windows. On one side is a plain, unornamented porch. The dates of this wing and the one-story shed addition are unknown.

Structurally, the Marcellus Pedrick house is in good condition. The Ripon Historical Society plans to repair that exterior detailing which is in need of attention and to renovate the interior according to mid-nineteenth century tastes.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Marcellus Pedrick house is significant as the earliest known structure in Wisconsin built with any form of concrete block construction, and as an early example of such construction in the United States. United States Patents specifically mentioning "cement block" were first issued in the mid-1830's. Interest in Wisconsin in this type of building material is evidenced by U. S. Patent #12,264 issued January 16, 1855, to John A. Messinger, Milwaukee, and A. Foster, Portland, Dodge County. This patent was for an "improved building block composed of twelve parts sand to one part lime and pressed in moulds." The Pedrick house, built in 1858, is the earliest of a group of four pre-Civil War houses in Ripon built with "cement block" about three decades before the use of such material became widely accepted. Statewide architectural survey in Wisconsin has revealed to date no other pre-Civil War concrete block structures.

Marcellus Pedrick (1828-1899) was a son of Samual and Millicent Pedrick who settled in Ripon in April, 1849, and who built the first permanent house in the city. Marcellus and his brothers were stone masons, and are credited with building many of Ripon's early houses. In addition to his career as a builder, Pedrick was a grain dealer, the owner of a lumber and coal yard and of a dairy farm. He was respected as a community leader, was active in the temperance movement, and was elected mayor in 1887.

Pedrick is thought to have built his house at the time of his marriage to Mary A. Smith, Fall River, in 1858. He is also believed to have built subsequently the three other houses utilizing this type of concrete block construction known in Ripon. The similarity between the size and color of the concrete blocks and the limestone block used in Ripon's more expensive buildings suggests that Pedrick may have used the blocks as a less expensive substitute for stone.
