DESCRIPTION The Simonson Farmstead house is a 1½ story structure with gambrel and gable roofs. It was built in two sections: the gabled section about 1890, and the gambrel section, built perpendicular to the original design, in 1906. The building has a cast concrete foundation, beveled wood siding, and three single stack chimneys. The front facade (gambrel section) features a pseudo-colonial door surround and three shed dormers in the upper half-story. All upper sashes of the windows have leaded glass and entabulature surrounds. The south facade has an open porch with turned columns under a gable wall dormer. The farmstead also includes a gambrel barn, chicken brooder, chicken house, corn crib, and machine shed. These were all built in 1929 after a tornado destroyed the original out-buildings.

STYLE Vernacular; Neo-Dutch Colonial DATE 1890 (est) and 1906

SIGNIFICANCE The Simonson Farmstead is important in three areas: architecture, agriculture, and settlement. Architecturally, it is one of the finest examples of the Neo-Dutch Colonial influence in the resource are, added to the visibly-older original section. Agriculture and settlement are important because the farmstead itself reflects the growth and devlopment of both categories within the resource area. The rebuilding of the out-buildings after their destruction by a tornado captures the determination of the homesteader during the development of Yankton County.
