The Browning House was constructed in 1873 and is a product of Early American architectural development utilizing a semi-cruciform around plan. This plan allowed all rooms to be light and airy and permitted structural enlargement whenever new social and economic conditions made it desirable. It is typical of the type of country houses of that era which were **d**esigned from the inside to the outside to correspond to particular individual demands but above all to the peculiarities, customs and needs of the builder in that each house was designed for a specific purpose and not to a specific style. The Browning House features plain flat brick walls and economy of detail with clean cut openings for the recessed doors and windows and light colored interior ceilings and walls. This is a basic element of Early American architecture and was unknown in Europe in the 1870's. Exterior and interior walls range from fourteen (14) to eighteen (18) inches in thickness doors and windows are recessed approximately seven (7) inches and ceiling heights are eleven feet six inches (11'6"). Floors were of yellow poplar and most of the floors are in a fair condition at the present time. It has four (4) rooms upstairs and four (4) rooms downstairs with an enclosed fireplace in each room. This is an irregular shaped two (2) story building, 38'x52' with an offset 18'x19' that is one (1) story high. The building is of brick construction with concrete and brick foundation, wood floors and a shingle roof. The building contains approximately 3,477 square feet. The building was restored by Procter and Gamble (operating contrator of Milan Army Ammunition Plant) in 1953 and utilized for additional office Restoration consisted of repairing doors, floors, walls, windows space. and other repairs minor in nature as required. The restoration also included installation of a fire escape for the second floor located on the south side of the building. Appearance of the original building proper has not been changed.

The "Browning House" is the childhood home of former Tennessee Governor, Gordon Browning. He was Governor of the State of Tennessee during the periods of 1937-1938 and 1949-1952. The house was occupied by Governor Browning during the period of 1904-1908. Governor Browning is Tennessee's only living ex-governor. Governor Browning was a veteran of both World War I and World War II and served in Congress as a Representative of Tennessee for twelve (12) years.

The "Browning House" is representative of the style homes constructed during the reconstruction years of the South in the late 1800's and is a good example of a mid 19th century Tennessee rural building. Very few two-story brick homes were constructed in West Tennessee and this is one of the few that were built in Gibson County. It has been a part of Milan Army Ammunition Plant since 1941. The building was used as a home during pre-Army ownership. It was not used during the period of 1941-1953. In 1953 the building was restored and utilized as an Administration Building until 1956 and at that time there being no further need for its use, it was placed in and currently is in Standby Status.

Honorable Gordon Browning.

EARLY YEARS

Gordon Browning was born on a farm near Atwood, Carroll County, Tennessee on November 22, 1889, the son of James Harvey and Melissa Brooks Browning. He attended a country school for seven years and walked the two and a half mile distance in order to attend the school. His next two (2) years of schooling were spent at Trezevant, Carroll County, Tennessee when the family moved there from his birthplace. The family then moved into the edge of Gibson County where his father's last homestead (The Browning House) was. At that time it was known as the old Cunningham Place. His high school days were spent at Milan High School, Milan, Gibson County, Tennessee and he graduated in 1908. As a farmer's son he did not have much time for play, walking to school, farm work and school work occupied most of his time, however he did play baseball while attending high school. After high school he attended Valparaiso University in Indiana where he graduated, and Cumberland Law School at Lebanon, Tennessee where he received a law degree. He began practicing law in Huntingdon, Tennessee in 1914.

Gordon Browning was 27 years old at the outbreak of World War I and enlisted in June 1917 after the declaration of war. He was sent to an officer's candidate school and commissioned as a 2nd Lieutenant in the 114th Field Artillery, a Tennessee volunteer unit of the National Guard. He served in three major battles during the bitterest days of the war, the St. Mihiel, the Meuse-Argonne and the Weovre offensives. He had been promoted to the rank of Captain at the time of these battles.

When the United States entered into the hostilities of World War II Gordon Browning wired the War Department immediately offering his services. He entered service at his old rank of Captain and for awhile commanded the antiaircraft units in the Los Angeles sector. He was selected to attend the military government service school and upon graduation was sent to England to help plan the invasion, where he served on General Eisenhower's Staff. He was eventually promoted to the rank of Lieutenant Colonel. After the invasion of Belgium he was assigned as first deputy in charge of civil affairs in Belgium, and then promoted to the post of command for both the American and British where he directed the restoration of government throughout Belgium. He was awarded the Order of Leopold and the Ordre de la Couronne by the Belgium government. He also received the Legion of Merit (U.S.A.), the Order of the British Empire (England), the Order of Orange Nassau (Netherlands), and the Order of Adolph Nassau (Luxembourg) for his services in restoring civil government in the low countries. Lieutenant Colonel Browning was assigned as political and civil affairs advisor to General Lucius Clay at the end of the war and later assigned as Governor of Bavaria, a major state in the American zone where he reorganized the military and local governments before returning to civilian life in 1947.

POLITICAL SERVICE

. .

In 1922 Gordon Browning was elected to serve in Congress which he did until 1934. In 1934 he made an unsuccessful campaign for the U.S. Senate, however in 1936 he ran for Governor of the State of Tennessee and won by a landslide. His outstanding achievement during that term (1937-1938) was his budget law and debt refinancing plan. He was defeated in 1938 for re-election. After returning from World War II service he waged a highly successful campaign and was once again elected as Governor of the State of Tennessee in 1948. During his second term of office the State Library, Archives, Cordell Hull Building, House Office Building, a new School for the Blind and improvements to the School for the Deaf were constructed. Hard surfaced roads in the State were increased from 10,000 miles to 20,000 miles.
