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**SUMMARY**

J. Colin English School is located in the North Fort Myers area of Lee County at 120 Pine Island Road. Included within the National Register boundaries for the property are the original school building, a former cafeteria building, and a low marl stone wall that encloses a landscaped lawn in front of the school. The original school building is a modest example of the Mediterranean Revival style. Identifying features of the style present include arched window and door openings and decorative terra-cotta crests and finials. The former cafeteria was built in 1946 and has a masonry vernacular design. It is constructed of concrete block and has rough stucco exterior surfacing.

**PRESENT AND ORIGINAL APPEARANCE**

**Setting**

North Fort Myers is a sprawling unincorporated area on the north side of the Caloosahatchee River, between the City of Cape Coral and Interstate-75. The J. Colin English School complex is located west of Old Highway 41 (North Tamiami Trail) at 120 Pine Island Road. To the east of the school property is a narrow strip of county property that contains a water tower (photos 1 and 2). Immediately adjacent to the water tower is a small residential subdivision along Beachwood Court. Residential areas also border the school property on the south and west. Immediately to the north is the partially developed North Fort Myers Community Park.

The historic J. Colin English School is located at the southeastern corner of the school property, which is a rectangular tract of land measuring approximately ten acres. Surrounding the historic school on the north and west are a number of non-contributing school buildings that were added to the campus after the historic period. The area included within the proposed National Register boundaries contains the original school building and a contributing former cafeteria building (photos 3 and 17). Also included is a low random marl stone wall that was constructed at the same time as the original school building and runs along the southern boundary of the property (photo 4). The lawn between the school and the stone wall is landscaped with sabal palm, cypress, and oak trees and a variety of shrubs.

**J. COLIN ENGLISH SCHOOL**

**Exterior**

Like most of the schools erected in Lee County during the 1920s, the J. Colin English School has a central block with wings plan. The walls of the original portions of the building are constructed of hollow clay tile and are finished with a brick veneer. Additions to the rear of the east and west extensions of the building

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have concrete block walls and stucco exterior fabric. All of the building units have flat, built-up roofs with a low parapet. The parapets are topped with an overhanging brick course and a decorative dentil cornice.

*Facade (south elevation)*

The facade or south elevation is divided into five bays (photo 3). The central bay contains most of the building's decorative elements (photo 5). A double-door entrance with a twelve-light transom is recessed behind an arched opening. The arched portion of the opening has a stucco surround that contrast with the brick walls of the building. The surround extends to a stepped parapet with square and rectangular raised panels. The parapet is framed by raised molding and urn finials adorn the corners. Pairs of narrow arched windows with stuccoed hoods are located on either side of the entrance arch. Above the windows are decorative terra-cotta crests that are inscribed with "1928," the year construction on the school began.

Shed roof extensions with pantile surfacing run flank the main block. Each extension contains a group of three large arched windows with brick caps and lintels. The openings have been partially filled and now contain small rectangular metal windows.

The outer wings of the facade are identical and feature a large central window flanked by two smaller rectangular windows. The window groupings are joined by a decorative masonry hood.

*West and east sides*

The west and east sides of the building have the same configurations (photos 6 and 9). The primary architectural elements are two sets of windows that copy the configuration of those in the outer wings of the facade. At the mid point of each elevation the exterior wall fabric changes from brick to stucco, showing clearly the extent of the original building and two classroom additions that were added in 1949.

*Rear (north elevation)*

The window pattern of the outer bays of the facade and sides is carried to two sets of windows located in the walls between the wing extensions and the auditorium (photo 7). An arched window with a brick surround is located in the walls of the original wings that face the auditorium. The remaining fenestration in the wing additions and the auditorium consists of single rectangular windows. Paired doors located at the corners of the wings lead to the school hallway.

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**Exterior alterations**

The most significant exterior alterations to the original appearance of the building are the replacement of all the original windows and doors and the two classroom additions to the rear of the wings. Built in 1949, the classroom additions fall within the period of historic significance for the school. A small rectangular addition, which houses the school's electrical plant, was attached to the rear of the west wing during the late 1950s. The installation of the replacement windows occurred during a 1970 renovation of the building. At about the same time, air conditioning units that are located in the central openings of the window groupings were added.

**Interior**

Most of the interior spaces of the building are intact and exhibit their original woodwork and appointments. The main entrance to the building opens a U-shaped hall through which all of the school rooms are accessed. The east/west running portion of the hall contains a series of decorative archways (photo 10). The rectangular door openings of the original portion of the wings are visible midway down the north/south running halls and lead to the classroom additions to the rear of the building (photo 11). Most of the original wood panel doors and six-light transoms have been preserved (photo 12). The original portion of the school contains six classrooms that feature built-in cabinets and blackboards (photos 13 and 14). Boy's and Girl's bathrooms are located at the ends of the east/west running halls, and the original school offices, which now house spaces for the school counselor and curriculum technology, are located in the central bay extension. The two rear additions contain classrooms and bathrooms that mirror those of the original wings.

**Interior alterations**

The most significant interior alteration has been the subdivision of the auditorium into office and storage space (photo 15). The area now contains seven rooms that serve as the school's reception area, records storage, principal and assistant principal offices, clinic, a waiting area, and general storage. Other interior alterations include the lowering of the classroom ceilings to accommodate electrical and air-conditioning conduits and the covering of some of the plaster walls with wood paneling.

**CAFETERIA**

The cafeteria is a rectangular concrete block building with a low-pitched, metal, gable roof (photos 16 and 17). A small gable extension projects from the north wall. The exterior walls are covered with rough-textured stucco. Fenestration consists of large rectangular double-hung sash windows. The windows are divided by square pilasters. Entrances to the building are located on the south elevation and west side.

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The interior of the cafeteria was subdivided into two classrooms in the late 1950s (photo 18). Other alterations to the original appearance of the building include the enclosure of several of the window openings and the replacement of the original doorway on the west side.

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**SUMMARY**

J. Colin English School is eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places under criteria A and C at the local level in the areas of education and architecture. It was constructed in 1928 at the end of a massive building campaign undertaken by the Lee County School Board in the 1920s to improve school facilities throughout the county. It is the most significant surviving historic building in the unincorporated area of North Fort Myers. In the area of architecture the building is significant as an example of an early twentieth century school and as a good illustration of the Mediterranean Revival style as it was applied to public buildings. It contributes to the *Historic Resources of Lee County, Florida* multiple property group under historic context V, **Historic Development of the Lee County School System, 1887-1950** and property type F.3, **Educational Buildings**.

**DEVELOPMENT OF J. COLIN ENGLISH SCHOOL**

The sprawling unincorporated community of North Fort Myers encompasses a number of historic place names. The area in which the J. Colin English School is located was formerly known as New Prospect. The oldest of the communities in North Fort Myers, New Prospect was founded in 1872 when a group of settlers planted orange groves there. In 1884 a cemetery was established and the first New Prospect school, a small wood frame building, was constructed. The first subdivision in the area was platted in 1911. Settlement of the community remained sparse until the land boom years of the mid 1920s. In 1926 two large residential subdivisions--Palmona Park and Tamiami Estates--were platted. Subsequent development, especially in Palmona Park, led to a rapid increase in the area's population, and in early 1928 a group of New Prospect residents petitioned the Lee County Board of Public Instruction to erect a new school in the community.<sup>1</sup>

In February 1928 the School Board approved New Prospect's request for permission to issue \$40,000 in bonds for the construction of the New Prospect School. A five acre tract of land on the north side of Pine Island Road was donated to the board by the J.W. Williams Company. In July architect N. Gaillard Walker was commissioned to draw plans for the new school.<sup>2</sup>

Work on the New Prospect School was begun in the fall of 1928. The contractor for the building was C.

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**Franklyn Wheeler**, who had previously constructed the Alva High School in 1927. The building, which was designed in the then popular Mediterranean Revival style and featured eight classrooms and an auditorium, was completed in time for the opening of the 1929 school year. The first principal of the school was Harry F. Henry. In November the trustees of the school district petitioned the School Board to change the school's name to J. Colin English School, in honor of the then Lee County school superintendent.<sup>3</sup>

English was born in the western Lee County community of Alva in 1895. He was one of several members of the prominent pioneer English family that helped settle the Alva area. After graduating from Alva High School in 1913, he went to Emory University in Atlanta. He graduated from Emory in 1917 and served with 303rd Company of the Quartermaster Corps during World War I. While overseas he attended post-graduate courses at the University of Edinburgh in Scotland. English returned to Lee County in the early 1920s and was elected school superintendent in 1924. His term, which lasted until 1932, was distinguished by the consolidation of the county's school districts and the first concerted county-wide school building program. He also guided the school system through the toughest years of the Great Depression when many of the local school districts went bankrupt. In 1936 English was elected Superintendent of Florida Schools and moved to Tallahassee. His experience in Lee County during the Depression prompted him to establish a statewide financing system that struggling school districts could tap for emergency funds. In 1948 he was a candidate for governor, but lost to Fuller Warren of Jacksonville. He remained in Tallahassee until his death in 1985.<sup>4</sup>

The J. Colin English School has been in continuous service since its completion. In 1946 a cafeteria building was constructed immediately to the rear of the auditorium. Two years later, two classrooms were added to the rear of the wings of the original building. In anticipation of subsequent expansions of the school complex, an additional ten acres of land surrounding the school property were purchased in 1950. In 1957, after the erection of a larger cafeteria, the original cafeteria was subdivided for use as classroom space. Four additional classroom buildings and a library were added to the property between 1953 and 1971. During a 1970 renovation of the original school building, the auditorium was subdivided into administrative offices.<sup>5</sup>

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**CONCLUSION**

**Criterion A**

J. Colin English School is eligible for listing the National Register of Historic Places under criterion A in the area of education. It is the only surviving historic educational building in the North Fort Myers area of Lee County. It was constructed as part of a general expansion program undertaken by the Lee County School Board in response to a rapidly growing population of school age children during the years of the Florida Land Boom. In the context of Florida's history, it is also a relatively rare, example of a historic school that continues to serve its original function.

**Criterion C**

The building has additional significance under criterion C as an example of the use of contemporary architectural concepts in educational facility design. Designed for a small population of school age children, the school featured eight spacious, well lit classrooms, an auditorium, and indoor bathroom facilities. The 1948 addition brought the total number of classrooms to ten, and the 1946 cafeteria building was among the first free standing facilities of its kind in Lee County.

The school has further significance under criterion C as an example of the work of prominent local architect N. Gaillard Walker, who was one of two architects hired by the Lee County Board of Public Instruction to draw plans for schools erected in the late 1920s. It is the only surviving historic Mediterranean Revival style building the community. Elements of the style are exhibited by a stepped parapet with urn finials and raised panels, terra-cotta crests, and arched window and door openings. With the exception of the removal of the original windows and doors, the building retains its historic exterior appearance to a high degree. It is the largest and most architecturally elaborate historic building in North Fort Myers. The low marl stone wall is a landscape feature that is unique among the Lee County's schools.

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**VERBAL BOUNDARY DESCRIPTION**

The J. Colin English School is located on a parcel of land on the north side of Pine Island Road, approximately 200 yards west of Fowler Street. The boundary encompasses the historic school building, the adjoining historic cafeteria building, the random marl stone wall, and the land immediately surrounding these resources, as shown on the attached site plan.

**BOUNDARY JUSTIFICATION**

The boundary includes the significant historic resources and the area immediately around them that were associated with the school during the period of significance, 1928-1949.

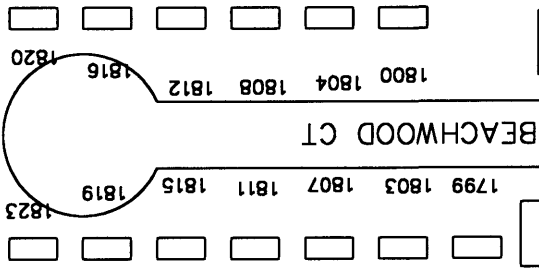
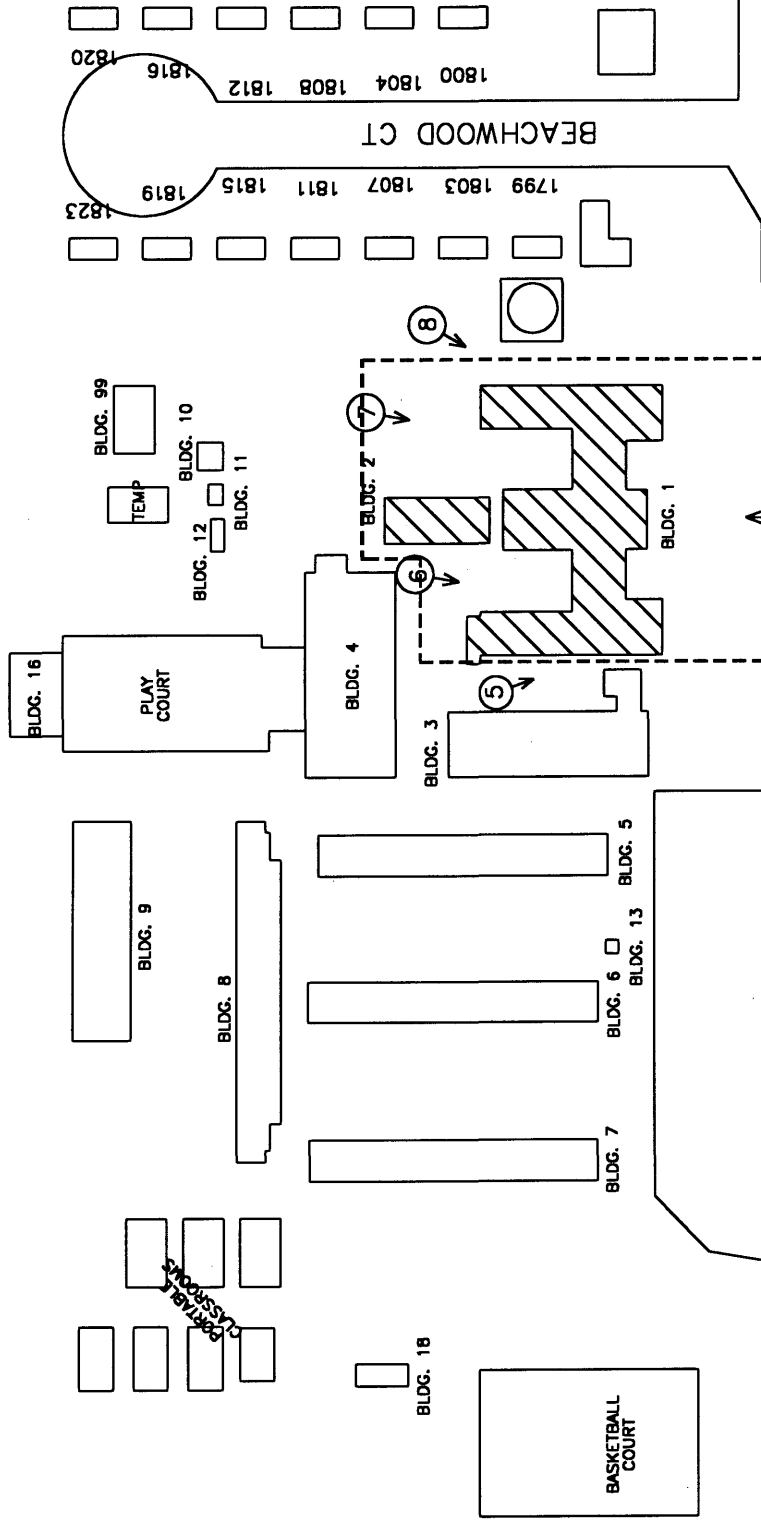
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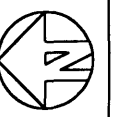
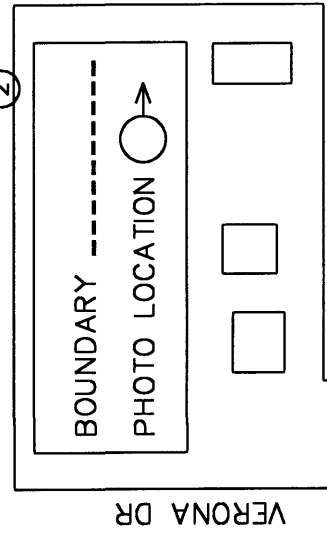

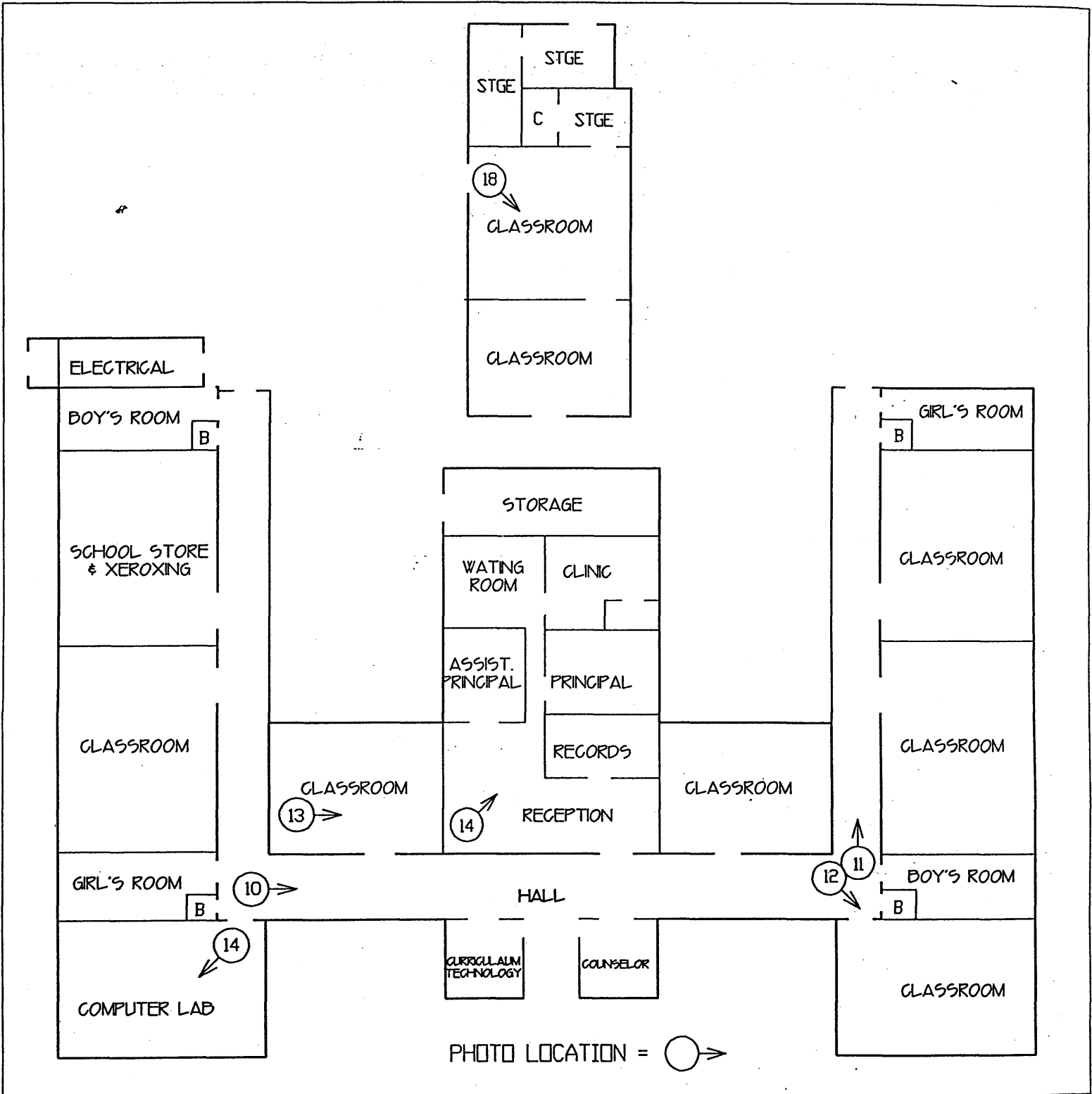

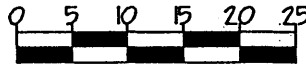
