#### DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Milano Hotel, built in 1905 on the cliffs above the Pacific Ocean between Gualala and Bowens Landing, California, is a two story frame venacular structure in the "Flat Front Italianate" style. It is built entirely of redwood by local craftsmen of the period under the direction of the owner Batiste Luchinetti who operated it as a hotel, saloon and dining room.

The upstairs contained seven hotel rooms and two bathrooms, and the main floor contained the family living quarters and a saloon, dining room, sitting room and kitchens. Two of the original outbuildings survive, the carriage shed and a small barn.

In later years the building was modernized by the removal of the second floor porch, and picture windows were installed in place of the multipaned windows. The bar and dining room were converted to bedrooms and much of the incidental Victorian detail was covered.

Current restoration plans (supported by the accompanying drawing), based upon historical photos, will return the Milano Hotel to its authentic original 1906 appearance.

#### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Gualala, California on the Mendocino Coast, about 30 miles north of Fort Ross and 20 miles south of Point Arena, was an important Logging area at the turn of the century, and a stopping point on the stage route between Fort Ross and Mendocino Village.

It was to this area that an Italian immigrant and wine grower, Batiste Luchinetti, brought his family, and upon observing the success of the Gualala Hotel built in 1903, proceeded to construct his own small hotel, naming it "The Milano Hotel" after his homeland. Batiste built the Hotel on a magnificent site on the cliffs above the Facific Ocean a mile north of the village of Gualala, facing the trail that would become Old Highway One, and the railroad serving the lumber mills of the North Coast. The Milano Hotel soon became a popular stopping place for travelers on their way to Fort Bragg or San Francisco, as well as the lumbermen who came out of the woods on Saturday night to enjoy a bath, a few drinks, and family style Italian dinners. The meals were cooked on a hugh iron stove shipped round the Horn and still in use today.

The Milano Hotel is bounded on the South by "Big Gulch" which was spanned at the turn of the century by a large timber trestle carrying both the road and the railroad. After crossing the trestle the railroad passed about fifty feet from the front porch of the hotel (the trestle was torn down in the 1940's when Highway One was still visible). The logging railroad is of historical significance for being one of the widest guage roads in the country, having been built so that two oxen could walk between the rails pulling the cars; when the lumber companys bought their first steam locomotive they had to have special wode wheels built to fit the tracks.

Because of the prominence of the large white two story building on the bluffs, it quickly became a well known landmark for ships plying the coast and in about 1915 provided shelter for the crew of a shipwreck off Castle Rock just in front of the property.

The Hotel survived the San Francisco Earthquake of 1906 with only the loss of the bottles on the back bar of the saloon, and through the years has been a social focal point for many of the activities of this small community including many of the wedding parties of the local families. It is for these reasons that the hotel is significant in its contributions to the lumber industry and the development of transportation and commerce in this remote
