

Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

7. Description

The Hart house is set in a private garden in a mid-twentieth century residential area of Baton Rouge. Boundaries were drawn to include the garden, the house, a late-nineteenth century gazebo and an old board and batten garage.

The house itself is a one and one-half story, frame Queen Anne Revival structure with a partial "wrap around" front gallery and a large central semioctagonal dormer. The plan is centered around an "L" shaped hall which encompasses a rear living room with an elaborate Colonial Revival mantel. There are three bedrooms with replaced mantels and a rear kitchen-dining room wing.

This rear wing was substantially enlarged in the mid-twentieth century. Other changes made at that time include: (1) the addition of a bathroom on the side gallery; (2) the replacement of the gallery floor; (3) the replacement of window and door cornices on the front facade; and (4) the addition of a cast iron door and ballustrade. Despite these changes the house still conveys a turn-of-the-century appearance.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph) Criterion B

The Hart House is historically significant due to its association with Robert A. Hart, a prominent Baton Rouge businessman and land developer who was mayor of the city from 1898 until 1902. Hart purchased Magnolia Mound Plantation in 1904, but never occupied the old home himself. He chose instead to have the home now known as the Hart House built nearby as his residence.

Baton Rouge was incorporated in 1898 and Hart was the first mayor of the newly incorporated city. A lifelong resident of Baton Rouge, Hart was highly esteemed by his contemporaries. A 1901 source included the following assessment: "Mayor Robert A. Hart, the guiding financier of city affairs, is thoroughly a man of the people of Baton Rouge, and it has been partly through his keen business instincts that matters of city improvement have progressed most successfully." Hart died in Baton Rouge in 1939. The first line of his obituary read: "There passed away yesterday a gentleman who knew Baton Rouge as do few of this generation." For these reasons, it seems quite obvious that Hart was a locally prominent individual and that his house, therefore, is locally significant.

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
