

DESCRIBE THE P							

The only non-domestic structure surviving in the present village of Esmond from the earliest period its manufacturing development is a stone building thirty foot square on the exterior, two stories plus attic with gable roof on Esmond Street south of the mill dam. The rubble walls of the building which appears to have been the company storehouse, are typical of the construction of cotton textile mills and associated structures in the area built during and after the War of 1812.

The original fenestration is largely evident, although the eastern first story window of the front facade has been some-what enlarged. This and other alterations may have occurred during the last decades of the nineteenth century or the early years of the twentieth when the building became the United States Post Office. A side entrance on the southwestern end of the building appears to be a later change, perhaps replacing an original window. A flat pedimented front door enframement with attached columns on protruding plinths and surrounded with wooden rustication similarly appears to be an alteration, but one which provides an important visual point to the simple building.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Long considered the cotton mill erected in 1813) by Governor Philip Allen, it is more likely that this sole surviving stone structure of the early mill was the company Philip Allen's brother, Zachariah, recorded in his Diary for March 5, 1821 a list of costs for carpentry "paid by P. Allen for building his factory" which includes the earliest description of the "Cotton mill 36 feet by 60 from outside to outside". An insurance policy taken by Philip Allen in 1836 includes his stone cotton factory as well as a "Store and clotheroom". Corroboration for the use of the surviving 30 foot square stone building as the company storehouse is found in a lithograph map entitled "The Cotton Mill Estate, Smithfield, R.I." surveyed by Cushing and Farnum and recorded in the town deeds (plat al0) in 1858. The building is recorded as number 10, a "Storehouse (of) Stone" and measured 30' x 30' on the map. The post office was located in the building in 1937 when the Federal Writer's Project published the guidebook of Rhode Island, calling the building the "old Allenville Mill".

The original owner of the property, Esek Smith, sold this plot of 42 empty acres to Philip Allen in 1813. Allen maintained ownership of this mill complex known as Allenville during his terms as Governor of Rhode Island (1851-53) and sold the property during his terms as United States Senator (1853-59) in 1857. The business again changed ownership in 1860 and was renamed the Smithfield Manufacturing Company.

The significance of the small store building as the sole surviving non-domestic structure of the early nineteenth century mill complex built by one of the state's major political figures is enhanced by comparison with other mill villages in Rhode Island. Nearly all of the company storehouses of the hundreds of mill communities erected in the state prior to the mid/nineteenth century have been destroyed. A survey of the vernacular architecture of Rhode Island mill villages taken in 1970 failed to locate an earlier storage building in the state. An integral part of the manufacturing community of the period, this small structure at Esmond retains its visual prominence in the village and could be rehabilitated to continue its long history of public use.
