The Downing House is rich in decorative features. Outstanding is the round corner tower with its finial, brackets, dentil and window molding, as well as the different types of shingles. The gable is used in the facade three times: over the porch, at the second floor roof line, and on the attic dormer. The rich motifs on the bargeboards and in the peaks are also repeated. The porch abounds with more of what is often called gingerbread: the columns, the balustrade, and the spindles at the eaves. On the side of the house is still another gable below which is a slanted bay framing a round window. The popular bracket and pendant decoration softens the cut-off corners.

The exterior has been unaltered through June 1972, when a fire confined to the third floor caused smoke discoloration at that level and partially destroyed the roof.

The interior was divided into five apartments many years ago, but the original elaborate woodwork and fixtures have remained. The recent fire will require considerable construction work on the third floor.

The following statement has been condensed from ...Gone Tomorrow?, a publication on Palo Alto's architectural heritage, published in 1971 by the American Association of University Women, Palo Alto, California Branch:

In 1890 Pale Alto was a grain field with five houses. The reason for Pale Alto's founding was the founding of Stanford University. The early close ties with the university were largely responsible for Pale Alto's solid origins and consequent growth. The nucleus of the new town in the grain field was immediately around University Avenue. There were located what contemporary newspapers called the "neat cottages," the homes of the artisans and merchants. Sprinkled between were the homes of the more affluent, known as "handsome residences." Toward the bay were the dairies, orchards, and strawberry ranches.

In Falo Alto's first decade there were occasional undeveloped blocks even near the center of town. T. B. Downing, a member of the first city council of Palo Alto and an early member of the school board, had one of the largest and most ornate homes in the fast-disappearing grain fields, built in 1894 at 706 Cowper.

This house is the most outstanding, extant example of the Queen Anne Style in Palo Alto.
