STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE: The Hilliard House is architecturally significant as Lawrence County's only	PHOTOS
I-house, this nomination's only 2-story house, and the only known example	
of a 2-story log house in eastern Mississippi. It exhibits a high quality of workmanship, seen in its wall logs hewn on four sides, joined with $\frac{1}{2}$ -dove-	
tailed corners and marked with roman numerals to assure the correct placing	
of the logs. Although the integrity of the front facade has been jeopardized	
by the new brick facade, the high degree of integrity exhibited by the struc- ture's interior and its importance as noted above warrant its inclusion. The	
outbuilding on the property, a smoke house, is the most well built outbuilding	
in the county. Its wall logs are hewn on all sides and joined with $\frac{1}{2}$ -notches. The resulting close fit of the logs required no other ceiling and is an un-	
common example of fine workmanship.

The Hilliard House is historically associated with the Hilliard family who migrated to Lawrence County from North Carolina. Capt. Robert Hilliard served in the War of 1812 and came to Lawrence County with Gen. Arthur Fox before 1814 This property was bought by John H. Hilliard in 1839 and included 325 acres at that time. The Hilliards were a wealthy and prominent family and represent the Pearl River's cotton planter class in Lawrence County.
